
GRAPHIC NOVELS IN CAMPBELL'S LIBRARY -more than a comic book



English and Art courses have been studying graphic novels in their courses. Check out our graphic novel collection the next time you are in the library.




The Curious Case of Benjamin Button by F. Scott Fitzgerald
