Diploma Requirements

An Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD) requires the completion of:

- a minimum of 30 credits, including 18 compulsory and 12 optional
- 40 hours of community involvement activities
- the literacy requirement

The 18 compulsory credits are:

- 4 English, one per grade level
- 1 French as a Second Language
- 3 Mathematics, at least one in Grade 11 or 12
- 2 Science
- 1 Canadian Geography
- 1 Canadian History
- 1 Arts (dance, drama, media, music, visual arts)
- 1 Health and Physical Education
- **0.5** Civics
- **0.5** Career Studies

Plus one credit from each of the following groups:

Group 1: additional credit in English or French as a Second Language*

- or a third language
- or Social Sciences and the Humanities
- or Canadian and World Studies
- or Guidance and Career Education
- or Cooperative Education*


Group 2: additional credit in Business Studies or French as a Second Language*

- or Health and Physical Education or Arts
- or Cooperative Education*

Group 3: a Grade 11 or 12 Science credit or French as a Second Language*

- or Technological Education
- **or** Computer Studies
- or Cooperative Education*

* A maximum of two credits in Co-operative Education and two credits in French can count as compulsories



Electives available vary depending on the school. Make sure you check myBlueprint for possible courses

Social Studies or GLE/GLS**

Arts (music, visual art, dance, drama etc)

Arts or Technology or Business or

** Full credit course available for students to improve learning skills and provide subject support. GLE is an option for students with an IEP. GLS is offered to students not on an IEP.

Semestered and Full-Year Schools

- Secondary schools are generally organized on either a full-year model (non semestered) or a half-year (semestered)
- Students in full year, non semestered secondary school usually study eight courses from September to June: The year is divided into two or three terms for reporting and examination purposes.
- Students in a half-year semestered secondary school usually study four courses from September to January and four courses from February to June with examinations and reports at the end of each semester.

Home School

- High school based on student's home address
- any student can attend their home school
- there is no registration form home schools, only submitting course selection on time

Optional Attendance

- May apply for up to 2 schools that are not the student's home school, for regular programming
- Parent/guardian delivers optional attendance form to the high school by due date
- If the school has space, students will be accepted.
- Optional attendance schools do not require criteria

Specialized Programs/Schools

- May apply for up to 2 programs/schools
- Acceptance based on criteria created by the high school
- Parent delivers optional attendance form and school specific applications to school by school set due dates
- Parents and students are responsible for ensuring all requirements of the program are met

Students with Exceptionalities

Parents/ Guardians should attend IPRC review meetings to:

- Investigate appropriate decisions about gr. 9
- Find specialized school program information
- Begin planning a pathway toward completion of secondary school



Grade 9 Program

The grade 9 program is chosen from a variety of course types that include Applied, Academic, Locally Developed Compulsory Credit Courses, and Open.

Academic courses cover the core content and have an emphasis on the theoretical aspects of the content.

Applied courses cover the core content and have an emphasis on practical application.

LDCC courses are available in math, science, and English. They are ideal for students who need more support in one or more of these subjects.

In addition, some courses are Open courses. The emphasis in these courses is the same for all students. Arts, business, technical courses are all examples of open courses.
