February 2017Winter Safety Tips

Winter has finally come to Toronto. This week our usual cold weather returned. We look to winter for its many wonderful opportunities for outdoor fun. We have had so little of typical winter weather this year, both fortunately and unfortunately, that we are hoping that the weather during March will be amenable to some outdoor winter play. In order to keep everyone safe, here are a few winter reminders:

- Wear warm clothing when appropriate, including hats, mitts, boots and snow pants
- Dressing in layers keeps children warmer, safer and more comfortable and allows for fluctuations in temperature. Please send indoor shoes to school so that the children can leave their wet boots and shoes at the back of the classroom.
- There is NO SNOW THROWING at school.
- · Pushing games are not allowed.
- Students are not allowed to run or play tag on or near the playscapes.
 They may not use the playscape if it is slippery or if the ground below it is frozen.
- I know you don't need another reminder but...You are aware of the dangers of scarves, cords and drawstrings on jackets, hats and coats. They can catch on playground equipment, escalators, fences, cribs, vehicles, etc. Please be alert to the potential danger that these components of clothing present to our children and make sure your child is dressed safely. Please label your child's winter clothing clearly.

New Phone Numbers, Addresses, Emergency Contacts

Please let the office know if you have any new phone numbers for work, home or cell and if you have a home address change so that we may update our computer data right away. Too often during emergencies when a child is ill, we contact work numbers only to find out that the parent no longer works there.

If you are moving away from the Arbor Glen PS cachement area, please advise the office in writing and provide two pieces of proof of residence, giving the last date your child will be attending here and advising us of the name and location of the new school.

How Do We Learn From Artifacts?

Do you know what the Archives Ontario are? On Tuesday, February 21st, 2017 the students in Grade 3, Maple Pod of Arbor Glen found an answer to that question from Ms. Little. Archives Ontario is a place where they keep diaries, old repot cards and attendances and more, donated by families across Ontario. From those artifacts we can learn about the past. Ms. Little started by telling the class about Archives Ontario. Can you

believe they let you touch everything?! Next, Ms. Little asked: "What do you keep or get during a trip?" Some of the students said:

"A diary." "A souvenir." "Stamps and pins." "Shells"

After, Ms. Little gave out photos and told the students to examine them. When the students were finished, they told the class a small detail they noticed on the photo with their group. Then Ms. Little told the students what primary sources are. A primary source is a photograph or painting made by an eyewitness— a person that saw something with his or her own eyes. Lastly, Ms. Little gave them a partner and a painting and a chart to fill out. In the chart they had to write down what kind of transportation they saw, how the land and community looked, what kinds of houses and buildings they saw and the ways someone could spend time in the place the painting was painted. At the back of the chart there were lines where the students filled in what objects they would have in their own Archives.

Wow! We can learn a lot from artifacts!!!




Forces

students discovered that more force equals farther distance.

Next, do you know why we need safety devices like seat belts? The students were really having a blast smashing their cars into the ruler that was supposed to be a fallen tree but they also learned that it is very important to wear safety devices such as seat belts.

Then, do you know why we have rubber tires instead of materials that are slippery? The students tested materials to see which had more grip.

Maple Syrup at Forest Valley

On February 21st, our grade 4 and 5 class of Birch Pod went to Forest Valley for the day. While we were there, we learned about the First Nations methods of producing maple syrup and how the European settlers learned from them.

Today, we have a lot of tools that they didn't have. Now, we use metal boilers and tools for every step of production. We mine for metals and use them regularly to make tools. The First Nations people didn't do that yet. Instead, they cut trees and used them in creative ways to meet their needs. They used hollowed-out logs to collect the sap from the maple trees and placed hot stones into the logs containing sap so as to boil it. The First Nations people used wooden items or items easily found in nature. We use different items now because a wooden pot would burn easily so we use metal. We have a lot of new technology that helps us so we don't have to do all the work.

Back then, children had to do a lot of chores like helping with cooking, sewing and fetching water. The children may have helped collect sticks for fires and even cut down trees. Children back then would have had to help with a lot of these things that we don't need to do any more. Children nowadays don't have to do all that because adults do it for us. First Nations children would have helped tap trees, boil and collect sap.

Although there are differences in technology, back then First Nations, early settlers and even today's maple syrup producers have to work for our product even if we do it differently. We all end up with the same product--maple syrup. They used wood, we use metal. But we both finish with maple syrup. We just have different ways of making it!

TDSB Participates in Preparing for Earth Hour

On Friday March 24, the Toronto District School Board will participate in Earth Hour by reducing its energy consumption as much as possible. Earth Day is a worldwide environmental event. Schools seize Earth Day and the period around the day itself as an opportunity to highlight the importance of the environment to our children's future. Here are some actions suggested by our students that you can do to take part in helping the environment:

- Shut Down/Turn Off Turn off the lights, the computer and the TV when they are not in use. Turn off the water while brushing your teeth and turn back on to rinse. Using only highly efficient and money saving appliances can reduce the electricity consumption of an average household.
- Eat It Choose foods produced organically, locally and in season. Support your regional farmers & farming industry. Buying locally and in season is better for the environment than buying foods that have been shipped hundreds of kilometers to your local market.
- 3) Don't Be Idle Turn off your car's engine if stopped for more than 10 seconds. If every driver of a light duty vehicle avoided idling by five minutes a day, collectively, we would save 1.8 million litres of fuel per day, almost 4 500 tons of GHG emissions, and \$1.7 million in fuel costs each day (assuming fuel costs are \$0.95/L).
- 4) Keep Your Eye On The Temperature Set your thermostat above room temperature in the summer and below room temperature in the winter. For each degree you adjust, you can save five per cent on your utility bill and one per cent on your energy use.
- 5) Don't Dump It! Blue Box It! The simple act of recycling has more impact on the environment that the average Canadian thinks. The amount of wood and paper North Americans throw away each year is enough to heat five million homes for 200 years.
- 6) Tell Someone This is a great opportunity to brag. Tell someone what you're doing to make the world a better place. Support the cause. Encourage them to get involved too!

Earth Hour uses the simple action of turning off the lights for one hour to deliver a powerful message about the need for action on

climate change. Each school and office in the TDSB is challenged to be electricity free for JUST ONE HOUR on Friday, March 24^{th} from 2-3 p.m. Each school and office will make its own plan for Earth Hour. Our school will participate by turning off lights, heaters, computer monitors, and even electric pencil sharpeners!
