March Character Trait Focus: Honesty



The definition of HONESTY is the quality or fact of being truthful, sincere, and fair. Honesty requires several other character traits such as good judgment, responsibility, loyalty, and courage. Teaching your students the importance of practicing honesty on a daily basis not only sets the dynamic of your classroom for the year, but it sets each student up for success in their future endeavors. It is a huge part of our job to begin molding our students into outstanding and trustworthy citizens, which is why teaching honesty is an essential piece of the big picture.

What Parents or Teachers Can Do...

- 1. Explain the meaning of honesty.
- 2. Share your experiences with them. Let them know that you aren't perfect. Explain a time when it was difficult for you to tell the truth and how honesty helped you.
- 3. Explain that there are consequences of dishonesty, such as losing the trust and respect of others, covering up a lie leads to more lies, and often times will result in embarrassment or punishment.
- 4. Use mentor text to show examples of different characters.
- 5. Use songs about honesty to add a fun twist. Analyze the lyrics and/or sing along!
- 6. Plan some hands-on activities with your child/children.
- 7. Praise and/or reward them when they display the trait of honesty.









Helping All Students Succeed

In December, the Enhancing Equity Task Force shared a report that provided a number of recommendations for how to support student achievement and well-being through improving equity within our system.

Our team has now reviewed that report and I want to share with you our response and proposed directions to move our system forward to enhance our support for each and every student in the TDSB.

Ensuring that each and every student is successful means providing every student with the right tools, resources, supports, access and opportunities they need to thrive. Making this happen requires a whole-system perspective which includes examining our policies, procedures and practices; building staff capacity; reviewing our resources and how they're distributed; and setting high expectations and increasing access. Real change, we know, happens in the classroom but it must be supported by changes at the system level to be transformational.

This report is the next step in our equity commitment. It will be discussed by Trustees at the Planning and Priorities Committee on January 31 and then at the Board meeting on February 7. Its proposed direction - if approved by the Board in February - will inform our work moving forward. Finally, if approved, these broad directions this will lead to more detailed implementation. And, it should be noted that where implementation requires a change to an existing Board policy, staff will bring a report to Board on the proposed policy change that will also offer opportunities for public input and consultation.

We will continue to work with and listen to our communities. Thank you to all students, staff, families and community members who have shared their voice, experiences, insights and time. This work is important and we appreciate your commitment to and involvement in the process.

Stay Healthy During Flu Season

Flu season is here again. The Ontario government is encouraging Ontarians to avoid getting sick this flu season by getting their annual flu shot.

Toronto Public Health is recommending that whenever students and staff experience flu-like symptoms, they are sent home and do not return to school until they are no longer infectious to others. Therefore, ill students and staff should be symptom-free (especially from vomiting and diarrhea) for at least 48 hours before returning to school.

The primary concern is for the health and safety of all students and staff. Please note that no special measures are required when there is a case of influenza in a school or daycare. However, everyone should do their part to stop the spread of the flu. As parents, you can also assist by:

- reminding children to wash their hands often especially after using the washroom and before and after eating;
- reminding children to cover their sneeze and cough;
- watching for symptoms of vomiting, diarrhea, dizziness, and/or high fever;
- informing the school if your child is ill;
- keeping your child at home when he/she is ill.

Winter Weather and Student Transportation

From time to time, it may be necessary to cancel student transportation, classes and/or programs due to severe weather. On rare occasions, severe weather makes it necessary to close schools, administrative offices or sites.

With approximately 246,000 students in our schools and sites each day, any decision to cancel buses, classes and/or programs or to close sites can have a significant impact on thousands of families across Toronto. This decision is not taken lightly. When schools remain open on days with inclement weather, parents/guardians make the final decision on whether to send their children to school and they can keep children home from school if they so choose.
