Friday Fun Family Sports: A fun time had by all over the summer

Each Friday from mid June through to the first week of September, families from the Blake Street community got together on the field of Blake Street school to play sports. We met Fridays between 6 and 8 p.m., and had a pretty fun time.

On different Friday nights the number of families and sports we played varied. At our peak we had about 50 people, and had simultaneous: cycling, badminton, basketball, playing on play structure, t-ball, cricket, throwing and catching (baseball), and then wrapped up with a big game of soccer.

Other nights there were fewer people, which turned out to be a good chance to get in some baseball batting practice. On the last Friday of the summer (Friday September 4th), we

played baseball with three generations and two families, incorporating enormously long bases spanning the entire Blake Street field.

Cricket games were a common fixture for kicking off “Friday funs.” Sara Bosch’s grandpa would sometimes start off the game, using his knowledge from playing as a boy in England. Thankfully Naeem, the dad of Zuhair, Rayyan and Arriz, promptly arrived to take over leading the cricket. He knows a lot about the game from playing in Pakistan and Canada.

During Fridays in early summer, some families brought picnic dinners & blankets to enjoy while at Family Fun Friday Sports.

For the soccer matches we used our bright blue and green pinnies, which were purchased with funds from the Blake Street Parent Council (thank you to the Parent Council!).



Sometimes we had a separate soccer game for children 6 years and under.

These are some of the comments some Blake students, parents and teachers about their experiences at Blake “family fun”:

Question: “What was your favourite part of Friday Fun Family Sports?”

Responses:

“I really enjoyed it when everyone was playing soccer” (Sara Ross, Grade 3). “Playing with my baseball glove” (Sarah B., Grade 1).

“I love the laid back nature of it... how there weren’t any referees or admission fees or anything like that. It was kind of a throw back... parents and kids



getting together in the neighbourhood for a good time” (Allan, father of Rowan, grade 3, Poppy, grade 1 & parent council co-chair).

“My favourite part was just seeing all the different families that were out. And being able to bring your own things, but if you didn’t have your own things there were lots of sports equipment to use. And there were lots of different activities to try... I’d never tried cricket before. That was pretty cool to hit my first cricket bat” (Ms. Dymant, librarian).

“Well your watermelon, ‘cause I love watermelon” (Poppy, grade 1).

“Soccer. Playing soccer.
“ (Kayden, grade 2).

“My favourite part about fun family sports was connecting with the community. And it didn’t matter what age or talent level you had, everybody was welcome and everybody managed to have fun” (Danielle Stamatiou, mother of Maximo in Grade 1 & Stella in junior kindergarden).

“The funest part was everything, ‘cause we got to do anything we wanted. We had fun. We all played. It was very delightful and fun” (Mohammed, grade 5).

“It was a great opportunity to get to know new parents and for kids to meet other kids... The last time I had played soccer was probably grade 10 gym. It felt awesome to get out there. My son especially loved it ‘cause he totally

creamed me” (Naomi Gillingham, mother of Benjamin, grade 6, Nadia, grade 3 & Ian, Senior Kindergarden).

“We came out 4 or 5 times at the beginning of the summer.

Having a reason to get out of the house at the end of the week, at a time when otherwise you might collapse and do something lethargic like sitting in front of the TV. So it was a community event. The kids maintained contact with their kids from school and we got outside and did fun things, like I played badminton with my wife.”

“Did you get out on the soccer pitch?” (Emma, interviewer)

“Oh I definitely did. I mean I played more defense and then some of the older elementary kids



commented on the few number of times I made contacted with the ball, but I defended my performance. And uh (laughs), I played with heart... But I did my best.” (Jamie Gillingham, father of Ian, Senior Kindergarden, Nadia, grade 3 & Ben, grade 6)

New Initiatives to be Voted On at Parent Council - 15 October 2015

The Parent Council is introducing a New Initiatives Procedure, where proposals are brought to the Council, discussed, and the vote takes place the following month. The following are the two new initiatives up for vote at the next Parent Council meeting.

Purchase a Cotton Candy Machine

The Fun Fair Committee would like to purchase a Cotton Candy machine, for use at the Fun Fair and other events such as the school dances. Currently we either rent or borrow a machine, if available.

COST: \$400

CURRENT COST: \$50 each time we rent it.

BENEFITS:

- High Margin Sales: For very little cost in supplies we gain a great deal in income. The cotton candy machine alone raises \$250 in profit at the Fun Fair.
- It is not always possible to rent a machine, or to borrow from Frankland school. Owning our own would guarantee access, and enable us to use it at all school events.
- With the number of events the machine could be used at it will pay for itself vis a vis renting.

RESOURCES REQUIRED: Storage

Classroom Startup Fund for Teachers

The Parent Council would like to provide teachers an ongoing reimbursement of classroom set up costs, to the value of \$100 per classroom per year. Teachers would submit receipts to the Parent Council Co-chairs and Treasurer to be reviewed and reimbursed.

COST: \$1750 (Currently 17.5 classrooms)

FUTURE COST: The annual cost of this will increase as the school grows.

BENEFITS:

- Teachers can spend the money on items required for their individual needs. We did consider making an arrangement with a particular store, but decided against restricting teachers.
- Every classroom in the school will benefit from this outlay.
- Annual fund, teachers can rely on it when planning their classrooms.

Open Communication from the TDSB

Dear Parents/Guardians,

We wanted to provide you with an update about job action being taken by teaching staff represented by the [Elementary Teachers' Federation of Ontario \(ETFO\)](#) and the [Canadian Union of Public Employees \(CUPE\)](#), which represents support staff.

Currently, both unions are in ongoing province-wide labour negotiations with the Government of Ontario and public school boards. As a result, members of ETFO and CUPE are taking part in a legal job action that will impact our schools.

It's important to note that schools remain open and instructional programs continue to run. During these extraordinary times in our schools, principals and vice-principals are working together with staff to maintain a caring and positive school environment. As always, student safety and learning remain the top priorities of all TDSB staff, and superintendents are in daily contact with our schools to assess any concerns.

Elementary Teachers' Federation of Ontario

Recently, ETFO escalated its work-to-rule campaign to include a number of new measures — the full list of which was posted on September 18th at <http://www.tdsb.on.ca/labour>. As a result, some activities and events (e.g. curriculum nights and fundraising events) may need to be postponed or cancelled. Wherever possible, schools are working to reschedule affected events.

ETFO has stated that if sufficient progress is not made in negotiations it **MAY** implement rotating one-day strikes in October. Should rotating strikes occur, we will provide you with as much notice as possible about the impact on our schools.

Canadian Union of Public Employees (e.g. custodians, school office staff, educational assistants)

Today, CUPE (e.g. custodians, school office staff, educational assistants) has started a partial withdrawal of services which includes:

- Not sweeping entrances and hallways
- Not doing school compost programs
- Not cutting grass or cleaning up leaves unless there is a safety concern
- Not collecting or accepting money for school-related initiatives and fundraising

As the withdrawal of services continues, it **MAY** have a more significant impact on school activities and permits.

Please note, child care programs are currently operating according to their normal schedules.

As you can imagine, principals and vice-principals have had to take on additional tasks as a result of the ongoing job action and we appreciate your patience. During this time, there may be some delays when trying to contact your school office. While we appreciate offers of assistance from parents, volunteers cannot fulfill the duties of staff during a legal job action.

We remain hopeful that a fair agreement can be reached between unions, the Government of Ontario and public school boards in the very near future.

Veggie-packed Zucchini Muffins

This is a wonderfully spiced muffin recipe that's actually full of vegetables (no token carrot here). Chocolate chips are optional, but are often the convincing ingredient for my picky eater. These muffins freeze amazingly well; pop a frozen muffin in your child's lunch and it will be defrosted and ready to eat by lunchtime!

Yield: Approximately 24 muffins

3 large eggs	Preheat oven to 350°F.
1 cup olive or vegetable oil	Line 24 muffin cups with paper liners.
1 3/4 cups sugar	In a large bowl, beat the eggs with a whisk. Mix in oil and sugar, then zucchini and vanilla.
2-3 zucchini, grated	Combine flour, cinnamon, nutmeg, baking soda, baking powder and salt, as well as chocolate chips, if using.
2 teaspoons vanilla extract	Stir this into the egg mixture. Divide the batter into prepared pans.
3 cups all-purpose flour	Bake approximately 20 to 25 minutes, until a toothpick inserted in the centre of a muffin is removed clean.
1 tablespoon cinnamon	
1/8 teaspoon nutmeg	
1 teaspoon baking soda	
1/2 teaspoon baking powder	
1 teaspoon salt	
1 bag chocolate chips (optional)
