The novice team made it to the finals of the city-wide competition and finished in third place. The English department also continued the tradition of developing future educators by hosting a student teacher from the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education. With a professional background in corporate marketing and advertising with Mercedes-Benz



International, Mr. Ticar brought skills and knowledge and outstanding technological skills to bear in his recent practicum placement. One notable fresh idea Mr. Ticar brought to us, called "Blog of the Flies," offered students an opportunity to incorporate traditional literature, social media, and current events into the Grade 9 English curriculum. Grade 9 and 10 students, who studied *Romeo & Juliet* as a part of the drama novel series, enjoyed a special outing at the Toronto Centre for the Arts. The cast took an interactive approach with students, engaging with those in attendance at the beginning and middle of the play, and fielding questions at the end. Following the performance, our students met with the actor who plays Friar Laurence. He shared his insights into drama and performing for a younger audience. Afterwards, we participated in a workshop delivered by theatre company members. Students were engaged throughout, and the entire day brought William Shakespeare's work to life.

The Drama club had an exceptionally successful run with the Sears Drama Festival. With their self-composed and direct play, *The Voices*, students went to the Regional Finals at Hart House. Student Qudsiya Jabeen won an Acting Merit award. Additionally, the students performed their play for the Don Mills Middle School students and did a whole-school performance in the cafetorium.

#### **English and Drama Highlights continued**

Two students, Simona Kurdalieva and Qudsiya Jabee, participated in the gala performance of the TDSB Creates Spoken Word event at the Toronto Centre for the Arts. It was an inspiring evening of strong performances of both student-created spoken-word pieces and choreography. We were delighted to host the award winning Theatre for Young Audiences Company, Roseneath Theatre, who brought to DMCI their insightful and important show, *Outside*, that deals with the issues of homophobia and bullying.



In preparation for the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test, a number of Grade 10 students were invited to take part in a literacy workshop. They met twice a week for hour-long sessions focused on improving their reading and writing skills. Rather than leaving at 3:05 p.m., this group of dedicated students committed their free time to literacy development. Through independent, pair and small-group activities, students analyzed reading passages and wrote paragraphs and opinion essays. On March 26<sup>th</sup>, with confidence and granola bars in tow, students came to school and completed the OSSLT.

To add a more modern twist to our classes, students had great fun using our new iPad lab to create media projects. iMovie allowed students to create short films about social issues, conflicting characters, and popular themes. It's amazing how such powerful films can be made in such a short time. Watching the films was a definite highlight for all!


#### **English as a Second Language**

# **University of Toronto Science Fair Gold**

On March 28th, Don Mills' own Sophie Ngana participated in the Toronto Science Fair. The fair was a day where students from across Toronto presented the projects they worked on throughout the year to a panel of judges. Sophie's project was one that was two years in the making. In the summer going into Grade 11, she took a great interest in neuroscience and neurodegenerative disease research. She hoped to break into the field by developing a project surrounding neurodegenerative disease and the study of the disease in animal models. She spent most of her Grades 11 and 12 years working under the mentorship of Drs. Lorraine and Suneil Kalia, at the Toronto Western Research Institute. Her project studied the over expression of proteins, known as being pathologically linked to Parkinson's Disease, and its effects on the caenorhabdits elegans worm.



This is research that could prove useful later in Parkinson's research, as it established the worms as a viable model organism for future investigation. At the end of the fair, Sophie took home gold as well as an invitation to participate in the World Congress of Medical Physics and Biomedical Engineering in June.



#### **DMCI Coffee Cart**

This year, the students in the Developmental Disability Program have operated the DMCI Coffee Cart and sold hot beverages and cookies to the student body on special days. They have improved their social skills and math skills while raising money to support the program.


The 2014-2015 Euclid (Grade 12) Contest was written by a total of approximately 16 000 students from over 1300 schools.

12 certificates were awarded for Euclid (Grade 12).


Lily Wang received a medal. (scoring 75/100).

### **Highlights from the Social & Global Studies Department**

This year, the Social & Global Studies Department had its fair share of unique opportunities to explore and experience learning beyond the classroom and traditional curriculum. We are looking forward to continuing these initiatives during the next school year.



This fall, DMCI implemented a TDSB board initiative on mindfulness. Grade 9 students were given lessons in mindfulness — a type of meditation that encourages awareness of the present moment, in a non-judgmental way. In three workshops, over each semester, each Grade 9 student in geography learned mindfulness from 3P Coaches. Students practised deep belly breathing, "body scans" (a meditation exercise that draws attention to different parts of the body), and much more. This spring, the entire DMCI student body, teachers and staff have been using mindfulness daily in the form of a mindful minute — a stop and drop practice of becoming aware of the present moment.



Another regular course-related event was the Philosophy Café – an in-class event meant to encourage students to explore the history of philosophy and find connections in philosophy to their day-to-day life. This is done through online research, in-class discussion, as well as student and teacher collaboration.

Because students generally have a limited background in philosophy, this freedom to explore and express ideas in philosophy acts as a good stepping stone to further exploration later in the course. The Philosophy Café unit is modeled after an actual grassroots movement conceived as a forum for philosophical discussion, founded by philosopher Marc Sautet (1947–1998) in Paris, France, on December 13, 1992. A favorite aspect of this unit for many students is the opportunity to sip on decaffeinated coffee and eat munchies.



#### Highlights from the Social & Global Studies Department Con't

Our Civics students travelled to tour both City Hall and Queen's Park to see politics and civic duty in action. More than just the Mayor's office, City Hall is also the

home of our city counsel – where all the big decisions that govern our city takes place. At City Hall, students had the chance to see some of the daily operations of an iconic multicultural metropolis.

While City Hall is the heart of the city, Queen's Park is its equivalent at the provincial level. Students had the opportunity to visit the political battlegrounds where debates on various legislative and regulatory issues take place, but more importantly, where policy is formed and can affect our students' lives as well.



In addition to the trips to City Hall and Queen's Park, Don Mills hosted its annual Model United Nations (or "MUN" as the students affectionately call it), where numerous schools and hundreds of students congregated in a mock U.N. conference. Taking on the persona of various nations around the world, students participated in simulation debates over various global issues – from global warming and climate change, to international commerce, to poverty, to health issues. MUN continues to be a staple at Don Mills where many civic-minded students get a chance to pursue ideas of civic and global advocacy.

Another greatly anticipated excursion experienced by the DMCI Law students was the field trips down to the Ontario Supreme Courts. Students taking Law got to witness first-hand how part of our fundamental judicial system works. More than just ritualized practice, the courts provide students the chance to see how the laws created at the provincial and federal levels are being applied in real-life situations. Students were given pre-approved court room cases to visit and observe.



This year, the HSP3U students travelled to the Centre for Addiction & Mental Health (CAMH) to grasp a greater appreciation of some of the challenges in areas of mental health and its issues that affect all Canadians. With a growing emphasis in promoting both physical and mental health and wellness, the visit to CAMH helped open the eyes and ears of DMCI students, bringing awareness to the forefront.

Students of CHY4U (a Grade 12 history course) took in the wondrous works of Michelangelo at the AGO. Being able to see his works first-hand helped to transcend the experiences of the arts beyond pictures seen in textbooks, magazines and online.

# French

The **French Dept.** is passionately active and creative. Mme. Baltov organized events for enrichment of our French program. Grade 10 French students attended Cinefranco in February to watch "La Belle and la Bete". In April, Grade 11 students studied "George Dandin" by Moliere and then attended a production of this play at the University of Toronto's French Theater.

During the March Break of 2015, Mme. Calhoun, one of the senior French teachers, accompanied a group of DMCI students on a wonderful excursion to Europe. They visited cities in Germany, Austria, Italy and Switzerland.

# Don Mills Programming Gala a Huge Success

In the DMCI Programming Club we introduced students to various algorithms as well as discussed solving contest problems by cleverly implementing these algorithms in Java, Python, or C++.

In order to encourage students to become interested in solving contest-style programming problems and to allow our members to enjoy some healthy competition, we held our first Don Mills Open Programming Contest (DMOCP) in October.

The DMOPC is now held monthly on the  $\underline{\text{DMOJ}}$  and consistently has 70 to 120 students participating from across the province!

As the school year came to an end, we decided to do something different for the final DMOPC of the year – why not host an onsite event?

On May 28, 150 students from across the Greater Toronto Area participated in our Programming Gala, where they took part in a 3-hour programming contest and listened to our guest speaker, Steve Engels, who is a lecturer in Computer Science at the University of Toronto.

#### **Robotics**

2014-2015 was another successful season for the DMCI "Electric Sheep" VEX Robotics team, one of the longest in recent memory. It began in November, at the Toronto Qualifiers. Considering it was our first tournament of the year, we did fairly well, with the A Team placing in the top 30 teams out of 70.

Unfortunately, we were not able to advance to the elimination rounds, but our enthusiasm and sportsmanship were rewarded when we received the Energy Award. It was the first such award won by

DMCI, and it made the day memorable. From this first tournament, we gained much valuable experience, which we later applied in our robot designs for our next tournament in December at the York Qualifiers.



This time, we fared much better. The Electric Sheep A Team placed 6th after the qualifying rounds and was the 4th seeded alliance. The A Team selected the Electric Sheep B Team as part of their alliance, and along with 4659A Raven Robotics, we won a close quarter-final series. We advanced to the semi-finals, but just barely lost to the first seeded alliance, who went on to win it all.

At our next tournament in Mississauga, we entered with a revised design of the original B Team robot.

While we encountered many difficulties in the qualifying rounds, and were not able to place high in the rankings, we did attempt the Skills field for the first time and placed in the Top 15 on the provincial level. This secured us a place in the provincial championships.

We attended the championships for the first time in club history at St. Catherine's in March 2015, which was an amazing experience. There, we competed amongst the best 55 teams across the province, placing 43rd, which was quite the accomplishment. But unfortunately, our season ended here and we were not able to qualify for the World Championships.





#### **Robotics continued**

We are very proud of what we have accomplished. We worked hard deep into the season and learned so much. We used aluminum parts in our design for the first time this year, which made our robot lighter and much more efficient. Next year, we hope to implement pneumatic systems in our designs.

We had fun on the Friday nights before the tournaments when we worked and ate pizza late into the night. We never gave up when we had numerous software and hardware problems at the worst times during the tournaments. We smiled and worked through it all. Next year, we have our sights set high; we hope to qualify for Worlds. As a senior member, I am leaving the club this year, but I have confidence in their talent to qualify next year. I'd like to thank the Robotics Club for providing me an awesome experience these past two years, and I wish next year's team the best of luck.



#### **Programming Competition Results**

DMCI came in first at the final (provincial) round of the ECOO team programming competition. Team 1 (Guanzhong Chen, Tony Li, Timothy Li, and Tudor Brindus) also came in first at the TDSB round while Team 2 (Eduard Ionescu, Tudor Brindus, Brian Forbes, and Patrick Au) came in fifth.

#### **Excellent Results at CCC and CCO**

Congratulations to Timothy Li, who achieved a perfect score on both the Canadian Computing Competition (CCC) and on the CCO (Canadian Computing Olympiad) making him Canada's top programmer! He'll be representing Canada at the International Olympiad of Informatics in Kazakhstan this summer. Amazing job! As well, Guanzhong Chen earned a silver medal at the CCO and scored in the Group 1 Category on the CCC.

Our next highest scoring students were Eduard Ionescu, Tudor Brindus and Tony Li, who scored in the Group 2, Group 3, and Group 4 categories on the CCC respectively.



Then, in the February Provincials, with over 6000 competitors, our students won a very respectable 6 medals. Rose Ghaedi placed in the top 6 for the written competition in her category. And top 15 placements were won by Connie Yu and Fei Wang on the exams in their category, by Langni Zeng on her oral competition, and by Brendan Zhang and Gene Liang for their written submission.

#### **Model UN Club**

The Model UN Club at Don Mills capped off an active year by mounting its own very successful conference in late March attended by 140 students from more than a dozen schools from across the GTA. All the hard work including months of planning, followed by weeks of almost daily practice-chairing sessions that even stretched over the March break, paid off. The roughly twenty club members did a very professional job of running six different day-long meetings in which the most significant world issues of the day were debated.

Throughout the year, the club also succeeded in taking home major awards from each of the three conferences it attended. In October, the team distinguished itself by winning five awards at the Lakeshore C.I. Model UN conference. Tebat Jasim won an Honourable Mention award, Daphne Yang and Debanjan Paul each won Most Diplomatic awards, Cindy Guo took an Outstanding Delegate award, and Yiwei Luo won one of the prized 'Best Delegate' awards. Then, in February, Yiwei won a Best Position Paper at the Havergal College Model UN. Finally, in May a team from Don Mills brought home four awards from the Cedarbrae C.I. Model UN Conference. Mimi Wang, Daphne Yang and Rose Ghuedi each won Honourable Mention awards, and Kristina Kisin won a `Best Delegate` award.

#### **Science Achievements**

McMaster Science Olympics

Don Mills brought a group of aspiring scientists to McMaster University to compete in an engineering competition mid-October. Aside from getting a tour of the campus and having tons of fun, the students competed in all sorts of engaging team competitions. As expected, our school came out with some great results.

Our Chemistry Forensics team of Fangwei Chang, Shannon Gui, and Emma Xie placed third in their competition, the Mental Gymnastics team of Mimi Wang, Jerry Zhang, and Jonathan Chang won 2nd place, our team of Daniel Zhou, Linda Low, Emma Xie, and Jennifer Du won 2nd place in L.E.A.P. Angry Birds, and, finally, our Egg High Jump group of Linda Qian, Yiwei Luo, Lucas Kim, and Cindy Guo won first place!

Grace Ting was in the Top 10% of 1663 students from across Canada in the Michael Smith Science Challenge competition for grade 9 and 10 students.



Ontario Association of Physics Teachers Contest for Grade 11 students. Dailin Li's score of 130 finished in the top 5 marks for the competition. Don Mills had the  $2^{nd}$  highest participation of all schools, with 71 students writing the contest.

2015 Canadian Chemistry Contest by Chemical Institute of Canada. This competition is use to select students for the National Chemistry Olympiad Team. Of the 12 students who wrote the competition the highest mark by a DMCI student was obtained by Fangwei Chang.

The Waterloo Grade 11 Chemistry contest (Avogadro) had 4397 exam writers. Dailin Li ranked 69<sup>th</sup> and Linda Qian ranked 147<sup>th</sup>. Don Mills had 4 students in the top 5% of all exam writers.

Don Mills had 4 students in the top 20% of the University of Waterloo Grade 12 Chemistry contest. Congratulations to Linda Qian, Wumfei Xie, Kevin Zheng, and Shannon Gui.

Don Mills Eco team raised money for famine relief in West Africa, prepared for our Gold Standard Eco schools audit and organized quest speakers on sustainability and bee keeping.

The Botany club grew plant specimens for labs and helped with the school's greening project.

Sophie Ngana received the Gold Medal at the Toronto science fair for her research on Worm Science, Investigating the viability of C.Elegans in Parkinsons Disease Research.


Northern Lights presented their  $13^{\rm th}$  annual "Spring Spectacular", an evening of singing and dancing before a very enthusiastic crowd.

If a student completes a summer school credit course within the TDSB, the transcript will be automatically updated. For TCDSB summer school, the original final report card must be presented to Guidance in September. Private school credits must be mailed directly by the private school to DMCI. Students who did not pre-register for a failed compulsory course will be automatically re-timetabled for the prerequisite credit. At the start of the school year, changes to students' timetables will only be made if necessary, i.e., to reflect updated credit course completions and to correct conflicts, errors and incomplete schedules. Students will only have one opportunity to request such a change.
