Now & Then



Vincent van Gogh is now known as an acclaimed, incomparable Post-impressionist painter. But when he lived in Arles, France, in the 1880s, he was mocked for being different. Back then, van Gogh was an eccentric man with wild red hair who used clashing hues to paint unusual-looking people and strange starry skies. Children and adults alike called him names and laughed at him. Nobody bought his art. But he kept painting. Inspired by these events, The Artist and Me is the fictional confession of one of van Gogh's bullies — a young boy who adopted the popular attitude of adults around him. It's not until the boy faces his victim alone that he realizes there is more than one way to see the world.

Shane Peacock, grade 2 at Agincourt Junior Public School rates says, "The first reason you should read this book is because it tries to tell you that you should never bully someone. That is just mean". He rates the book as a 5 star! "The second reason is because the artist in the book knew that everyone hated his art but he never stopped doing it. This story tells me that you should never let anyone, anything, any words or any people tease you, and never stop doing what you want to do", he adds.


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Now & Then
