The Natrel Rink, Harbourfront Centre

With over 100 skating classes for kids, teens and adults and skate and helmet rentals, you can lace up and skate along the beautiful lakeside scenery on Canada's largest artificial outdoor rink. The rink has DJ Skate Nights every

Saturday with rock, soul, soca music and more. It's great for anyone who wants to 'rock' on skates. Insider Tip: Rubber mats lead the way from the rink to adjacent buildings so you can walk indoors on your skates for food treats, hot cocoa and a warming fire. Open November 16 to mid-March. Annual HarbourKIDS Skating Festival: Feb 17th & 18th, 2014.



Evergreen Brick Works Nature Immersion: The Evergreen Brick Works Ice Trail

Skate along the Ice Trail (chairs available for tots) or hike the uphill trails, it's urban nature immersion at its best. Add bonfires, hot chocolate and marshmallows, twinkling lights, farmers selling their wares on

Saturday mornings—and the experience here is reminiscent of a Currier and Ives postcard. Skate rentals in all sizes; free skate sharpening. Insider Tip: Yes, you can take TTC to the Brick Works—free shuttle buses run daily from just north of Broadview Station:



Nathan Phillips Square, Toronto City Hall

Parents and kids often head to the expansive ice surface outside our spaceship-like City Hall. It's always busy, especially when lit up at night or on weekends. Zambonis keep the ice smooth. and benches alongside allow for

rest breaks—a terrific opportunity to watch diverse crowds testing their skills. Insider Tip: The square's new Skate Pavillion and Concession building offers rentals, change rooms, snacks, hot chocolate and a roof terrace for superb viewing. November — March, rink guards daily, 9:00 am to 10:00 pm

The Skating Oval at The Shops at Don Mills

While moms are shopping for dashing duds at Toronto's upscale open-air mall, why not bring your skates and work your muscles on Canada's only outdoor shopping mall ice surface? Insider Tip: This small rink great for kids Mid-November to March

Downtown Diversion: Lake Devo, Ryerson University

When studying at Ryerson, the small but quirky Lake Devo rink, appointed with huge granite boulders from Muskoka, provides a welcome break from technology and deadlines. This two-timing rink (a small pond in warm weather) is especially beautiful at night when lit up by the new Ryerson Image Centre; Devonshire Square at the corner of Victoria and Gould Streets.

Insider Tip: Bring your hockey stick to evening class. A city Zamboni makes regular trips to clean the ice surface —and evening games of pick-up shinny hockey happen spontaneously. From daylight until evening, weather permitting. Ryerson.ca Note: Be sure to check weather conditions before heading out to any of these skating places, as hours and openings are always 'weather permitting.' -

ELKHORN SCHOOL'S ROOF PROJECT



We are excited to tell you that the roof at Elkhorn PS is going to be repaired /replaced this year.

Construction will begin on approximately March 16, 2015 and be completed within approximately 3 weeks. The start date for construction and the completion time for the construction are subject to change,

depending on weather conditions.

Over time, this roof upgrade will ensure a continued safe learning environment for our students. This is part of a major roof repair initiative that's happening in the TDSB this year. Because of the volume of school roofs being repaired this year, work must continue throughout the school year during daylight hours however, we are making every effort to do as much work outside of regular school hours as possible.

The roofing process can cause strong and unpleasant odours, which, at times, may enter the building. Please be assured that there is no risk to our students and we are working with our facilities and health and safety teams to reduce discomfort including keeping windows and doors closed, ensuring all air intake openings are closed and that the building's ventilation system is on recirculation mode to ensure no outside air is introduced. Alternate accommodations will be made for students in the event of sensitivity to the fumes.

CHINESE NEW YEAR

Chinese New Year, also called Spring Festival, has more than 4,000 years of history. Being one of the traditional Chinese festivals, it is the grandest and the



most important festival for Chinese people. It is also the time for the whole family to get together, which is similar to Christmas Day to the westerners. Originating during the Shang Dynasty (about 17th - 11th century BC), it celebrates family reunion and the hopes of the advent of spring and flowers blossoming rich with full colorful activities. People from different regions and different ethnic groups celebrate it in their unique ways.

It is said that the custom of Chinese New Year started in when people offered sacrifice to ancestors in the last month of the Chinese lunar calendar. At that time, people prepared the sacrifice by doing thorough cleaning, having bathes and so on. Later, people began to worship different deities as well on that day. It is the time that almost all the farm works have been completed and people have free time. The sacrificing time changed according to the farming schedule and was not fixed until the Han Dynasty (202BC-220AD). The customs of worshipping deities and ancestors remains even though the ceremonies are not as grand as before. It is also the time that spring is coming, so people held all kinds of ceremonies to welcome it.

There are many legends about the Spring Festival in Chinese culture. In folk culture, it is also called "guonian" (meaning "passing a year"). It is said that the "nian" (year) was a strong monster which was fierce and cruel and ate one kind of animal including a human being a day. Human beings were scared and had to hide on the evening when the "nian" came out. Later, people found that "nian" was very scared of the colour red and also of fireworks. After that, people used the colour red and fireworks or firecrackers to drive away "nian". As a result, the custom of using red color and setting off fireworks remains.

Every family does a thorough house cleaning and purchases enough food, including fish, meat, roasted nuts and seeds, all kinds of candies and fruits, etc. for the festival period. Also, new clothes must be bought, especially for children. The Chinese character 'Fu' is pasted on the center of the door and picture cut out of paper adorn windows.

People have many taboos during this period. Many bad words such as "death", "broken", "killing", "ghost, "illness" or "sickness" are forbidden during conversations. In some places, there are more specific details. They consider it unlucky if the barrel of rice is empty, because they think they will have nothing to eat in the next year. Taking medicine is forbidden on this day,otherwise, it is believed that people will stay sick for the whole year and have to take medicine constantly.

Food eaten during this happy festival is representative of the Chinese culture. Dumplings and the reunion dinner are indispensable at this time. Cold and hot dishes are all served. Fish is always an important dish at this time, which expresses people's hope of having a wealthy year.
