### Remembrance Day

Remembrance Day marks the anniversary of the official end of the World War 1 hostilities on November 11, 1918. World War 1 was a massive conflict that was played out over the whole globe, but particularly in Europe, where troops from Canada supported the Allied forces.

World War 1 resulted in the loss of huge numbers of lives amongst both civilians and military personnel. Many more people were badly injured. The war left great emotional scars in the servicemen, who had experienced it, and in the communities, whose sons, brothers, fathers, uncles and even grandfathers had died. Remembrance Day commemorates those who died in armed conflicts, particularly in and since World War 1.

In Canada, November 11 is officially called Remembrance Day, but it is also known as Armistice Day and Poppy Day. Remembrance Day is commemorated in many countries, particularly members of the Commonwealth, including Australia and New Zealand (where it is also referred to as Armistice Day). In the United States, Veterans Day falls on the same date. In the United Kingdom, the Sunday closest to November 11 is known as Remembrance Sunday.

#### **Symbols**

Remembrance Day is symbolized by the artificial poppies that people wear and place at war memorials. The poppies may be worn or placed singly or as wreaths. The use of the poppy as a symbol of remembrance comes from a poem written by John McCrae, a Canadian doctor serving in the military. The poem is called In Flanders Fields and describes the poppies growing in the Flemish graveyards where soldiers were buried.

Poppies grow well in soil that has been disturbed. They also grew in large numbers on battle fields. The red color of their petals reminded people of the blood lost by victims of and casualties in the conflict. Some people choose to wear white poppies to campaign for non-military interventions in conflict situations.

Other symbols of Remembrance Day are the war memorials, which are often near the geographical center of communities. These commemorate members of the community, who have died in military action. A particularly well-known memorial is the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Ottawa, Ontario. The military parades held on November 11 are also symbolic of Remembrance Day.

Elkhorn students will be participating in a Remembrance Day assembly on November 11<sup>th</sup>.

Each student will receive a poppy to commemorate this occasion. Donations for the poppy can be handed in to the office or put in the poppy box that will be set up in the gymnasium. All these donations are used to support veterans and their families.



# Parent Teacher Interviews for Progress report cards

As parent teacher interviews will soon be upon us, we encourage you to take this opportunity to find out about your child's progress. Report cards will be sent home on Tuesday, November 15th.

Interviews will be occurring on Thursday evening and Friday during the day.

Please contact your child's teacher to *confirm or reschedule* an interview time according to the schedules they have given you.

Below are some questions and tips that you may find useful for the interview.

• Talk to your child about school before the interview if age appropriate. Ask how they think they are doing and how the teacher can help meet their goals.

• Get an idea of what the curriculum is like, the level your child is working at and areas where they are struggling.

• Make a list of what you want to know before you go into the interview. You can even prepare questions ahead of time if it will make you feel more at ease. Knowing what you want to know and writing it down ensures that you don't forget anything, and that you get the information you need in a timely manner.

• Be open and honest. Feel free to add your own observations around your child's behaviour, strengths and weaknesses.

• Find out what they're learning. Ask curriculum questions and find out what your child has learned and what is coming up in the term ahead. Know the skills your child will need to be successful in the term ahead (i.e. knowing how to multiply/divide fractions).

• Ask about strengths and weaknesses and possible problems. Find out about problems before they happen. This information will allow students to get help before they fall behind.

• Find out how often and how much homework is being assigned as it relates to the TDSB's Homework Policy.

• Ask if your child is completing his/her home-work regularly, how long the work assigned should take to complete and does the teacher check the home-work regularly and provide feedback. The answers to these questions will help you better monitor your child's work habits.

• Ask what you can do at home to help your child. Make a commitment to support your child's learning.
