## **Pre Visit Activities**

- Organize students into groups of 3 or 4's as discussed with Forest Valley program staff (required)
- Review <u>'Forest Valley Outdoor Education Centre, Map Reading Courses, Mapping a Life Skill'</u> (required)
- Review the appropriate <u>site maps</u> with your class
- Review mapping features with students (see document above)
- Have students take part in various mapping activities before the trip such as mapping a desktop, a classroom, the school yard and generating their own legends for the map.
- Familiarize students with cooperative games (e.g., TRIBES, name games, line up games...etc.)
- Practice communication activities (e.g., Back-to-Back drawing: students follow each other's drawing instructions without looking and debrief what worked and how to improve)
- Participate in a TDSB Character Trait assembly, and talk about how it relates to the classroom and wider community
- Begin a Know, Wonder, Learn (KWL) about the TDSB character trait to bring with you to Forest Valley
- Brainstorm the types of learning skills that will support success during their day at Forest Valley (e.g., self-awareness, self-monitoring, taking responsibility for personal actions, coping with stress, teamwork, risk-taking, communication etc.)
- Have students assess their learning skills before coming (e.g., What are my strengths? What is my next step?)

- have students write a personal goal statement based on their selfassessment to bring with them to Forest Valley
- Read books related to character development
- Engage students in reflective follow up activities after reading using oral, visual, written and/or dramatic communication

## **Post Visit Activities**

- Have students work in groups to create (and follow) maps of the schoolyard or classroom
- Try one of the cooperative activities you learned at Forest Valley back at school to review the learning skills
- After practicing with your own class, partner with another class to teach them the cooperative activity
- Make a Character Trait or Learning Skill Board and use photos and/or words to capture student examples of the Trait or Skill in action
- With your students, develop a presentation about what they have learned to share at your next Character Trait Assembly
- Have students reflect on their learning at Forest Valley in relation to their goal statement and plan a next step
- Consolidate the learning from the day by collecting strategies or ideas that were learned at Forest Valley and making an anchor chart
- Give students the opportunity to add positive captions to any of the photos taken of their Learning Skills Development and share them in a book, on a bulletin board and/or digitally
- Students reflect on how the concepts learned during the day can be applied to other school, social or family activities
- Continue debriefing shared and guided reading opportunities in terms of character traits and/or learning skills.
