Principal's Message:

It may be early in 2014, but the first term is nearing an end at Humbercrest. Teachers are in the process of completing their assessments of students, celebrating individual student progress and accomplishments, and setting goals for the remainder of the school year.

Grades 1 - 8 students will receive a report card that will be sent home with your child on February 13th, 2014. For Kindergarten students, only JK students will receive a report card in February.

Parent teacher interviews will be scheduled following the Family day weekend. For this round of interviews, no day time interviews are available as there is no PD Day designated in February. This means that interviews will be scheduled after school hours and by appointment only. Teachers will request interviews with parents for students, as follows:

- A student who is on an Individual Education Plan with modified expectations.
- A student for whom placement in a Special Education program or a change in

- program is being considered (for example, French Immersion to English).
- A student with significant decline in achievement and for whom promotion may be at risk.
- Or, parent/guardian request for an interview.

Enclosed with your child's report card will be an Interview Request Form containing more details about the interview process for your specific child.

Thank you for your continued collaboration and partnership in your child's education.

The completed registration package can be brought to the school office, during school hours. Please ensure that you complete your package and return it to us no later than March 6th.

When registering a child for school the following information is necessary:

- Proof of age (i.e. birth certificate, passport, baptismal certificate, etc.)
- Proof of address (i.e. purchase or lease agreement, utility bill with address, etc.)
- Proof of custody (where applicable)
- Proof of Canadian citizenship, permanent resident status or refugee status.

Launched in 2012, "We are Love" is a

- 1. We recently finished reading "The Boy in the Striped Pajamas" by John Boyne. This is a powerful story about a boy, Bruno, whose family moves to a home just outside of Auschwitz. Bruno makes friends with a boy his age on the other side of the fence, which alters the lives of all the characters in the book.
- 2. In geography we are looking at how location, environment, region, interaction and movement are affected by an event such as Typhoon Haiyan and putting it to practical use by creating an action plan to help the victims. A Filipino community member will be visiting the class to help decide which campaign we carry out.
- 3. This week we will be starting "Long Walk to Freedom" by Nelson Mandela. This is a timely choice, with Nelson Mandela's recent passing and with African Heritage Month in February.
- 4. Our classroom will be tracking Norway in the upcoming Sochi Olympics. We are planning fun activities and looking forward to learning a little bit about the Norwegian culture.

More Intermediate Division News:

This month, Mme. El-Kassem's grade 7 and 8 History and Geography classes will be delving deeper into examining the voices of those who are sometimes forgotten in History and on the world stage.

In grade 7 history, we are currently engaging in a debate about francophone language rights at the time of the British takeover of New France. We will then be moving on to look at the important role that First Nation's leaders like Pontiac and Tecumseh played in the development of Canada.

In grade 8 geography, students are examining population trends around the world and the different factors that account for differences in population density and distribution. This will help us with our next unit on looking at global inequality.

In grade 8 History, students will be beginning a unit on the unheard voices of Confederation, including First Nations and Women, in order to reflect on who was left out of discussions on the founding of our country.

All of our Intermediate English classes working with Mr. Wobowsk will be watching the movie "Invictus." It'a a film made a few years ago starring Morgan Freeman as Nelson Mandela. It tells the story of how he used the World Cup of Rugby to unite South Africa after he became president. The students will also study the poem "Invictus." The kids will be using the structure of the poem, but rewriting it to be about Mandela and his impact on the world.

February's Character trait is Fairness. Fairness and a sense of justice is something that we strive to instill in students every day at Humbercrest. Our students learn about social justice issues on a local and global level. We have collected donations of winter coats for students in local schools. Ask your child what it means to be fair? Ask them to explain what it feels like when someone is unfair? Discuss what equality means: is it that everyone gets the same, or that everyone gets what they need?
