

February is African Heritage Month at the Toronto District School Board and an opportunity to recognize the experiences, contributions and achievements of African Canadians. This year's theme is "From Africa to the World."

Throughout the month of February, we at Islington have highlighted the many contributions that the African community has made by offering several educational opportunities to our students, staff and the TDSB community. One of these included our Grade 8s visiting Etobicoke School of the Arts to watch a student-written and studentdirected performance in celebration of African Heritage Month.

In February, we also celebrated the energetic culture and traditions of the Chinese community with students, staff and community members. The Chinese community is integral to the growth and success of the City of Toronto and Canada. Members of the Chinese community represent approximately 10 per cent of the total GTA population and form its second largest visible minority group. Canadians remember and appreciate the Chinese workers who helped build the Canadian Pacific Railway that united our country.

ACHIEVEMENT

We continue to provide our students with relevant learning opportunities that centre around real-life problems that they can solve. In order to solve these problems they must be innovative, they must collaborate, communicate, be effective team members and they must think critically. This month, these are a few of the projects and opportunities that our students engaged in. We are extremely proud of the perseverance and positive attitude they demonstrated in all such learning experiences.

On January 29th eight Grade 7 students competed in the Cardboard Boat challenge at Swansea Junior and Senior School. They spent the morning building their boats out of only cardboard and duct tape, and in the afternoon they got a chance to test their boat's structure and speed in the pool!

Grade 6, 7 and 8 students from Ms. Porteous' class worked all term to design and build sustainable house models that can help humans live off the grid. They learned about green technologies such as green roofs, water recycling, thermal mass, and even installed working solar panels!

How to support your child's Mental Health

"Mental health touches all components of development. Mental health is much more than the absence of mental illness. Well-being is influenced not only by the absence of problems and risks but by the presence of factors, at the individual, family, and community level, that contribute to healthy growth and Development." (Kindergarten Program, p.62)

Here are some ways to help you support mental health:

- Encourage play, exercise and sport
- Help your child to learn some simple coping skills such as relaxation
- Help your child to effectively problem solve
- Help your child manage stress by building in some rest time
- Keep an eye out for changes in behaviour
- Make sure you take time to listen to what your child has to say
- Be patient with your child


