#### HEALTH AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION CURRICULUM (HPEC)

As you may know, the Ministry of Education recently directed all school boards across the province to use the re-issued 2010 HPEC as of this September. The Ministry of Education has the right to set curriculum for Ontario students. You can learn about the re-issued 2010 HPEC (Grades 1-8) by visiting the Ministry's 2010 HPEC-Grades 1-8. Based on a preliminary review of the re-issued 2010 HPEC (Grades 1-8) by Board staff, while the wording may be different than the 2015 curriculum, the 2010 curriculum still contains many critically important topics. However, some areas of the 2015 version may not be specifically included or included but at a different grade level.

Should you have any questions or concerns about how the curriculum will be or is being taught in your child's classroom, we encourage you to speak with your child's teacher, In rare instances we recommend parents follow the TDSB Parent Concern Protocol which may involve sharing your concerns with the school's Principal or Superintendent.

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

Our school is doing lots of work around student well-being and equity. In September, we celebrated the character trait of respect and our students learned about how respect is connected to our identities – cultural, racial, class, gender etc. and that, everyone deserves to be in a school where our identities are respected and celebrated. Through Orange Shirt Day, we talked about the experiences of Indigenous children in residential schooling and that, although this was a sad time in Canadian history, we MUST learn from it. Many of our classes are studying *Truth and Reconciliation* and determining what specific actions we can take individually and collectively to forge a new relationship with First Nations Peoples.

We are looking forward to celebrating Islamic Heritage Month in October! Our staff will be participating in a community walk on the October 5<sup>th</sup> PA day, during which we will visit various places in the community (including faith institutions) to explore how knowing our community makes us better educators, more equipped to create spaces in our classrooms and school that promote peace and inclusion.

As a school, we continue to place emphasis on the development of global competencies to ensure that our students have the transferrable skills they will require for a future that is difficult for us to predict. These competencies include: Critical thinking/problem solving, Citizenship, Communication, Collaboration, Creativity/Inquiry and Entrepreneurship. In all grades, students are engaging in inquiries, both in and outside the classroom that require them to ask questions, plan, explore, design solutions, test their solutions and reflect on this process. The emphasis is increasingly on the PROCESS of learning rather than just on the PRODUCT (or the final mark awarded by the teacher). Our Kindergartens to Grade 2 students are currently using computer applications to learn computer coding and robotics. Our junior and intermediate students are engaging in this learning through our maker space lab as well as in other subject areas such as the Arts, Social Studies, Math, Science, French, Health and many more!

### **Attendance**

Regular attendance is necessary to make progress at school. If your child is absent, the following actions need to be taken:

If a student is absent from school the whole day or part of a day, the parent should telephone the school prior to 8:30 in the morning or 12:30 in the afternoon, thus ensuring safe arrival. The telephone number is **416-394-**

**7874.** A note from a parent communicating the child's absence is also acceptable.

If a student is to be excused during the school day, the parent or guardian should send a note to school with the student explaining the circumstance **and** the parent may telephone the school.

Students will not be excused from school without parental consent. Notes should include date(s) of absence and parent's or guardian's signature.
