This year, the assessments will take place from Wednesday, May 23<sup>rd</sup> to Friday, June 1<sup>st</sup>. Once again, we remind parents that it is important that students attend school every day during the assessment. If possible, please try to arrange appointments outside of the testing period. We appreciate your cooperation.

#### Coding

This term in Ms. van Wonderen's Media Literacy classes students are learning about digital coding. We are using apps on the iPads, along with resources from code.org, to problem solve and collaborate with each other in our investigation. As the students learn simple coding commands they are gaining the language to communicate digitally and to explain the sequences and digital storytelling to their classmates. Along the way we are guiding our exploration with the question "How are we responsible and intentional digital learners?". For this learning have we volunteering with us Mr. Andrew MacNicol, an Engineering university grad coding with experience.

The visit was really exciting and fun! On Monday, March 26<sup>th</sup>, lots of people from the government came into our school to make a big announcement related to education. Those people included Premier Kathleen Wynne, Ms. Indira Naidoo-Harris, who is Minister of

Education, our Superintendent, Mr. John Chasty, Dr. John Malloy, the Director of Education, MPP Arthur Potts, and Robin Pilkey, the TDSB Chair.



First, these people came into our class; they went around the classroom asking us questions about the work we were doing. Mr. Potts sat down with my partner Vaughan and me (Malcolm). Just saying – it's pretty cool to have an MPP sit down and talk to you! I was nervous when they asked me a question because I didn't want to answer wrong.

When we stopped our lesson, we went down to the library to hear a speech by Kathleen Wynne. The library looked very different than it usually looks. There was a small stage, a stand with a microphone, a lot of news cameras and lots of red and blue chairs. Students were supposed to sit in the blue chairs.



It was pretty fun when Ms. Wynne was talking about our class and our work. Then it was finally time to hear the big announcement. The Premier said that the government will be giving 300 million dollars to education, mostly for kids with special needs, and will be employing 450 more guidance councillors for middle school. I was surprised at how calm the Premier was at the end of it, due to all those journalists shouting questions at her. Ms. Wynne said something that got my attention, which was that "\$12,000" is spent on each child in school. That is a lot.

That was our day with the Premier of Ontario!

In Science, we are preparing for tests and projects: Human Body Systems (grade 5); Solar System (grade 6). It has been a busy month for us!

For this year's Day of Pink celebration, each class memorized a school-wide pledge and


created a pink paper link chain. A positive message was written on each link. We went down to the gym to connect all the chains together (The chain is in the display case across from the gym!). Room 205

Another fun activity was the skating trip. It was one of our favourite activities this month! Although the skating trip was a little later in the year than we expected, it was still awesome! It was great to see skaters of diverse levels and abilities make the best of the skating experience!

day we wore a different colour to connect with various

themes.

We eagerly look forward to our We Walk for Water excursion to the beach on April 27. Our goal is to raise awareness of children around the world who walk numerous kilometers, carrying 20kg containers of water



daily for survival. In class, we brainstormed to concept of walking for water; created collaborative mind map sharing our prior knowledge and exploring the question: "How far would you walk for water?'; watched two videos where we had the opportunity to learn more about WE Walk for Water; and wrapped up with a whole class discussion about the We Walk for Water initiative.
