Special Education & Inclusion Summer School 2024



The information below provides a brief outline of the programs that will be offered this summer. Applications due: May 3, 2024

Session Date: July 2 to July 26, 2024 Time: 9 a.m. to 12 p.m.

Program Focus Description:

The Toronto District School Board (TDSB) is once again offering summer school for students who are currently enrolled in Developmental Disability, Deaf and Hard of Hearing, and Physical Disabilities Intensive Support Programs (ISPs). These half-day programs will be held in-person at various locations throughout the TDSB. Students will be supported to develop their independence through programming in the areas of functional literacy and numeracy skills, activities of daily living, communication, and social skills through a creative curriculum that can include technology, physical fitness, art, music and drama.

Sikh Heritage Month at the TDSB – April

Sikh Heritage Month has been proudly recognized at the Toronto District School Board (TDSB) since 2016 as the Board of Trustees voted to designate April of each year as Sikh Heritage Month making the TDSB the first school board in Canada to do so. Sikh Heritage Month is recognized nationally across Canada.

This year the Sikh Heritage Month's theme is Chardi Kala (The Positive and Uplifted State of Mind). According to Sikh beliefs, Chardi Kala is a state of mind that radiates positive energy, optimistic attitude, strong confidence, and virtuosity. With true belief in the supreme power of the Almighty and the oneness of humanity, this state of mind can pave a way for the well-being and happiness of all.



Ontario Autism Program - Entry to School Program

The Ontario Autism Program (OAP) Entry to School (ETC), is a program for young students with ASD where they will build school readiness skills. At the end of the program, children will enter school with a portfolio prepared by the ETS Transition

Facilitators with strategies that were used to support the child in their skill building classroom or childcare. In Toronto, ETC is delivered by the Toronto Autism Network (TAN), which consists of six agencies (Geneva Centre, Surrey Place, Lumenus, Strides, SAAAC and Kerry's Place) and are located across the city. This is a six-month, group-based, skill-building program with a focus on preparing young children with ASD who have never attended school to transition into Kindergarten or Grade 1.

Program options include:

- 1. Childcare Consultation: Transition Facilitators consult with Childcare staff biweekly.
- 2. ETS Skill Building Classrooms: Children attend a small group program in a classroom environment that is modelled after an Ontario Kindergarten classroom for 3-hours/day, 5-days/week.

Across both options, the following components are provided:

- 1. Programs are 6-months in duration.
- 2. Goals are set around building school readiness skills to support children in getting ready for Kindergarten or Grade 1.
- 3. At the end of the program, children enter school with a portfolio prepared by the ETS Transition Facilitators. This portfolio outlines the strategies that were used to support the child in their skill building classroom or childcare.
- 4. The ETS Transition Facilitator is available to consult with the classroom teacher around that portfolio for the first 6-months following the child's transition to school (please see the details below).

Please note that this program is for children who are not registered students in the TDSB. They may not attend school in TDSB for the other half day.

Ramadan 2024

Monday, March 11, 2024, marks the first week of Ramadan, one of the holiest months of Islamic calendar. During the month of Ramadan, Muslims worldwide abstain from food and water from sunrise to sunset for 29 or 30 consecutive days - as determined by the lunar calendar. Fasting is one of the five pillars of Islam. Muslims break their fast each evening with a communal dinner called an iftar. During Ramadan, Muslims make every effort to recite the Qur'an, participate in extra prayers, engage in charity, and complete good deeds to reach a higher level of spirituality. Once the month is over, Muslims celebrate Eid al-Fitr, the festival of breaking the fast with family and friends, wearing special clothes and sharing gifts for up to three days. Ramadan ends on April 9th. Eid is celebrated on April 10th.
