Message from the Principal and Vice-Principal

Although the past eight weeks have been challenging with our school closed, the creativity and commitment by our students and staff in their remote classrooms has been impressive. Teachers and support staff have been supporting student learning with a variety of synchronous and asynchronous learning activities.

To support ongoing learning, students have access to teacher created slide decks in mathematics that guide them through a new concept in a step by step manner, including practice activities and video tutorials. Some tutorials are even created by their own teachers! Ongoing feedback is provided to students directly in their submitted work, by private comment in Google Classroom or by email. Many teachers share exemplars of student work with feedback to encourage students to make improvements to their own assignments. In order to keep sharp with their mathematical and language skills, many students are taking advantage of educational platforms like Knowledgehook, Prodigy, Epic and Raz Kids which allow students to progress at their own level.

Wellbeing continues to be a focus in our remote learning spaces. Our students participate in the daily or weekly check-in survey. Questions are fun and help staff gage the learning and engagement of their students. Real time communication takes place using Google Meet and Hangouts where students get to connect with their teachers and peers. Many students look forward to those activities geared toward making them think or smile such as the daily version of O'Canada, the French Funny, the Hot Docs documentary and the weekly wrap up message.

For our students who seek enrichment, our rotary staff are providing challenges in Art, Music and Physical Education. Students

have had the opportunity to recreate a famous piece of art using found materials, create a playlist that reflects their current mood and participate in weight training using canned food as weights. For our students who are sharing technology, the MVMS Tic Tac Toe Choice Board includes a variety of off-line activities.

2020 - 21 SCHOOL YEAR

Each spring, a committee of teachers, the principal, vice-principal and members of School Council meet to plan the school's organization for the following year, based on the projected number of students, the staffing allocation and the needs of the students. Invariably, the model includes some combined or multi-grade classes and some single grades. Research shows that students do equally well academically in both kinds of classes.

After the teacher transfer and hiring process is completed in June, sending and receiving teachers meet to place the students of each grade into classes for September. Our goal is to create classes that are balanced in terms of gender, academic needs and strengths and social-emotional considerations. We try to have each student go to the new class with at least one friend and to separate students whose working relationship may have been less positive. If parents feel that there is something about their child's strengths and needs that we do not already know which we should consider during the placement process, they should send an email to the child's teacher, with a copy to Requests principal. for particular teachers or straight versus combined classes cannot be accommodated.

Children and parents will be informed of class placements on the first day of school in September. There are always factors in September, such as new or departing students, that might affect how classrooms are organized and in which class a child will be.


We have worked hard to organize for next year with the numbers of students we expect to have and are hopeful that our classes will require minimal changes in September. If any changes to classrooms are necessary, we will provide more information once school is underway. If required, adjustments to class size will take place during the first couple of weeks in September.

REMOTE LEARNING HIGHLIGHTS


Here are just a few examples of our students' work during remote learning.

Questions to discuss with your child:


- What does it mean to persevere?

Projects to do together:


- Talk about and agree on a family commitment motto. Call a family meeting and decide on a family motto related to perseverance.

- Discuss a role model and how he or she has persevered to achieve his or her goals and dreams.


Encouraging perseverance in your child:

French programs will also be available for students currently in a French Immersion or Extended French Program. Remote synchronous learning will be offered.
