

- The program is currently offered at the Grade 9 level and enrollment is open to all students who live in Toronto.
- We are excited to present a "de-streamed" cohort program, where all students will have access to the academic designation for all core subjects.
- With the success of the elementary Africentric Alternative School, a secondary Africentric pathway provides an option for students wishing to continue in a program with the same guiding principles.



- The Leonard Braithwaite Program gives students the chance to learn the provincial curriculum through the diverse perspectives, experiences and histories of people from the African Diaspora.
- An Africentric approach to learning is embedded in each course and the curriculum draws on African-centered sources of knowledge and perspectives to create a rich and diverse educational experience.
