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
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MAKING THE BEST OF WINTER WEATHER AT SCHOOL!



Fresh air and exercise are important for children. It keeps them physically fit, and helps them stay alert all through the school day. Parents can help by making sure their children come to school prepared to spend time outdoors. Hats, mitts, boots and a warm jacket are important to keep students comfortable during lunch and recess. On especially cold days children should dress in layers. For example a child might wear an undershirt, a long sleeved shirt, a sweat shirt or sweater and then a warm water resistant winter jacket. Likewise they might wear a pair of jeans with sweat pants over them and then snow-pants on top. Layering mitts and socks is also important. The outside mitt/glove layers should be water resistant. (Mitts and socks often get wet when children play in the snow, even with a water resistant layer. It's always a good idea to send extra mitts and socks in your child's backpack.) Don't forget to cover ears with a hat that has ear flaps or a pair of ear muffs.

Schools pay close attention to weather. When the wind chill is -28 c or lower children will remain indoors due to risk of frostnip and frostbite. When temperature and/or windchill factor indicates -20 to -27C,

recesses *may be* shortened to 10 minutes and lunch recess to 20 minutes.

Canadian winters can be wonderful, but are often cold. **Make sure your children are dressed appropriately** to walk to and from school, and to play outside for recess and lunch.

Congratulations to Karen M. from Mrs. Cuoppolo's class who won the Family Night draw and took home \$25 in books for herself and another \$25 in books for her classroom!



REMEMBRANCE DAY

On Remembrance Day, our school had an assembly in the gym to think about the brave men and women who sacrificed their lives so that we can live free.

First we stood and sang O Canada. This was followed by several poetry readings by students in grade 2/3, 4/5 and 5/6. HOCKEY HELMETS NEEDED






DOGS NOT ALLOWED ON SCHOOL PROPERTY
