










Forest of Reading Wrap Up

The end of April marks the conclusion of the Ontario Library Association's, "Forest of Reading" celebration of Canadian authors for this year. All primary classrooms read the "Blue Spruce" books, <u>https://bit.ly/2Fierf2</u> and voted for their favourites! Some of the primary French classrooms also read the "Prix Peupliers" selections <u>https://bit.ly/2ACXDMD</u>, and voted for their favourites in this category! Approximately 30 students in grades 3-6 read books in the Silver Birch Express, Silver Birch, and Le Prix Tamarac categories. Fifteen students were eligible to vote in one or more of these categories, because they read a minimum of 5 books within one category - most read all 10 in at least one category! An ice cream cake party was held in the library this past Monday to celebrate and vote.

Thanks so much to Parent Council for purchasing these 50 books each year as their contribution to our wonderful library! Happy reading until next year!



We Walk for Water

Blake's WE Schools club - made up of 30 students in grades 4-6 - continue to work hard this year on a variety of issues that they're passionate about! Our primary focus in 2019 has been fresh drinking water on First Nations communities in Canada, and in impoverished areas around the world. We marked World Water Day on March 22nd by participating in a Skype Global classroom in the library, and are proud to continue our work by raising awareness and funds for WE Walk for Water Day on Friday, May 10th.

Our entire WE Club has been invited by the WE organization to participate in a morning of awareness and activities at Regent Park in order to mark the day. We have been asked to be guest speakers, and to "take 6 laps for water" - a 50 minute 'journey' on the Regent Park track with other schools and special guests, to have a better understanding of what (primarily) girls have to do in communities around the world. Walking for water is one of the major activities that keep girls from going to school.

In order to continue to raise funds for fresh water access for First Nations communities in Ontario, we are going to hold at least two more freezie sales this year - on Thursday, May 9th at lunch, and at afternoon recess on Friday, May 10th. Since we did not hold a bake sale this year, we are hopeful that parents will consider donating a box of freezies to our club, so that the purchase of freezies doesn't have to come out of our fundraising efforts so far. If you would like to donate a box, please drop them in the office any time next week and let them know they're for the WE Schools initiative.


