

On Tuesday our grade 4/5 and 5/6 classes joined with EAST students to participate in a simulation exercise, something we as a staff participated in last fall. The Blanket Exercise "is a teaching tool that uses participatory popular education to raise awareness of the nation-to-nation relationships between Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples in Canada. It teaches a history of Canada that most never learn. ...The exercise is designed to deepen understanding of the denial of Indigenous peoples nationhood throughout Canadian history. It examines how federal programs and policies impact the lives of Indigenous peoples in Canada, and identifies what Indigenous peoples and their allies are doing to bring about a positive change." The session was led by teachers and staff, and facilitated by our elder in residence, Redfeather, a Migmaw community member. As the name suggests, the Blanket Exercise begins with blankets arranged on the floor to represent Canada before the arrival of European explorers and settlers. The participants, who represent Indigenous peoples, begin by moving around on the blankets. While a narrator reads from a script, other participants – representing the Europeans or newcomers – join and begin to interact with those on the blankets. As the script traces the history of the relationship between Europeans and Indigenous nations in Canada, the



participants respond to various cues and interact by reading prepared scrolls. At the end of the exercises only a few people remain on the blankets, which have been folded into small bundles and cover only a fraction of the original area. The morning began with welcomes, a smudging, the blanket exercise, and then a sharing circle related to our feelings of the morning. The afternoon session had students work in small groups led by teachers to delve into questions about the connection between land and culture, assimilation and residential schools, moved

into a question and answer period, and ended with another sharing circle about the days learning. It was a day of significant learning that will no doubt affect the way they see their country's history and the experiences of Indigenous communities as they move forward. Learning and debriefing are ongoing. This leaning opportunity will be provided to our junior students every other year, so if you have students currently in the grade 3/4 class who have missed it, they will have the opportunity to participate in this grade 5 and 6 curriculum specific learning in two years.

Blake's Learning Assembly

This Thursday, our school came together for our monthly learning assembly. Led by the students in Mr. Nicolaou 's grade 4/5 class and Mme Wald's grade 1 French immersion class, they reminded us of the value of community, something we have been working to build and celebrate at Blake Street. Mr. Nicolaou's class sang us in and out with a great song entitled MOSAIC (mutual respect, open mindedness, self-respect, attitude, individuality, community.). The key message stated: "if we live by these lessons, and spread them across land and sea, we can build a better future, and live together in peace". They reiterated this message through role plays highlighting each component of MOSAIC, encouraging the audience to guess the right one. Mme Wald's class also led us in song to a Gregg LeRock song and video which all our French students know, "c'est cone ca ici", representing how in our community, we are a family.

Finally the learning assembly concluded with Ms. Arthur sharing news of a new extra-curricular opportunity for our junior students with the introduction of a gay straight alliance (GSA). This great new club will ensure all voices feel heard, valued and included.
