The route will start at the corner of Pape and Riverdale.

Stay on Riverdale to Boultbee.

Those on bikes can follow the purple loop quickly around the building circular drive.

Stay eastbound on Boultbee.

Turn left (north) on Blake Street.

Turn right (east) on Strathcona.

Turn right (south) on Jones, followed by a very quick left (east) onto Baird Avenue.

Turn right (south) on Earl Grey Ave.

Turn left (east) on Dawson Ave.

Turn right (south) on Condor Ave.

Turn right (west) on Boultbee Ave.

Turn left (south) on Jones Ave. (This left hand turn will be the trickiest of the route. The bikes will wait for the cars on Myrtle Ave. before proceeding)

Follow Jones Ave. down the hill and up the hill under the bridge.

Turn left (east) on Myrtle Ave.

Turn right (south) on Leslie St.

Turn right (west) on Gerrard St.

Turn right (north) on Galt Ave.

Exit Galt Avenue by turning right down the alleyway at the top.

This alley will take you back to Jones Avenue.

The Day of the African Child

Last June 16th marked the International Day of the African Child. A Message from the TDSB About Secondary Program Review Interim Report

The <u>Interim Report of the Secondary Program Review</u> was presented to Trustees last month, a first step in the development of a plan to address the inequities and imbalances throughout our current system. This report supports our next step forward as we start to re-imagine and re-draw our system in consultation and collaboration with our communities to enhance equity and support the achievement and well-being of each and every student in the TDSB, now and in the future.

We want to hear from you! Any recommendations made through this process will have an impact on current elementary students, as young as Grade 1. Our plan, if approved by Trustees in the fall, will create the roadmap for changes to our secondary schools and programs over the next 8 to 10 years.

No specific schools have been named for consolidation and no further steps will be taken without extensive local community consultation. Over the next four months, students, parents, staff and community members can continue to provide feedback and further insight through delegations and their local Trustee, by email to secondaryreview@tdsb.on.ca or on our online form. The Secondary Program Review Final Report will be presented to the Board in October 2020.

Summer School

Our optional elementary summer school program focus is to close the achievement and well-being gap and to continue student engagement into July. Programs for students in Grades 3 to 8 will be delivered from July 6 to 31, 2020 from 9am to 12pm.

For students registering for English summer school, learning is focused on:

- Black affirmative learning content.
- Literacy instruction to improve fluency and comprehension.
- Learn about Transformative Justice.

Remote synchronous learning will be offered. There is a possibility that learning may move from remote learning to in-class learning environments in accordance with the ongoing guidance of the Ministry of Education. International Languages Elementary/African Heritage

The International Languages Elementary/African Heritage Program offers language classes to students Kindergarten to Grade 8. Classes will run from July 6 to 31, 2020 from 1:30 to 4pm. A minimum of 23 students is required to open a language class. Remote synchronous learning will be offered. There is a possibility that language learning may move from remote learning to in-class learning environments in accordance with the ongoing guidance of the Ministry of Education. Registration will be online and open on Monday, May 25, 2020. More information is available on www.ileprograms.ca.

Community Programs

Adult General Interest courses will be offered in July to continue to engage with existing learners, while increasing the presence and awareness of Learn4Life programs to new learners. Courses will be offered from July 6 to 31, 2020 through a synchronous online delivery model. Registration will be available through our website at www.learn4life.ca.

Adult ESL

Adult ESL is planning to deliver a remote synchronous learning model, with whole group and small group instruction, from July 6 to July 24, 2020 from 9:30am to 12:30pm. Classes will be five days a week for three weeks. We will also be implementing a modified Portfolio-Based Language Assessment program to include 1 to 2 assessments. The number of classes and levels will be based on student enrollment, interest and funding. More information is available on www.ESLtoronto.ca
