

Thank you to all of the teachers, staff, eco team, and parents that made this trip possible. We are proud of the hard work you did to help the salmon population!




Primary Book of the Month

These books are so much fun to read while also giving you a ton of interesting information. We recommend them for anyone in grade 3 and up. Happy guessing!



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
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Intermediate Book of the Month


