Orange Shirt Day

Established in 2013, Orange Shirt Day was inspired by Phyllis Webstad, who was excited to wear her new orange shirt to her first day of school in 1973. However, when she arrived at St. Joseph Mission Residential School, her shirt was taken and never returned. From that day forward, the colour orange, for Phyllis, "reminded me of that [moment] and how my feelings didn't matter, how no one cared and I felt like I was worth nothing. All of us little children were crying and no one cared." (Taken from Phyllis' Story Building Bridges 2019/2020: Level 1, Issue 1)

Now, on this day, we recognize the legacy of the residential school system for First Nations, Métis and Inuit families and communities.

We acknowledge the legacy of residential schools in Canada by wearing orange and we honour the survivors..

With Our Orange Hearts

The kindergarten students at Castlebar each created a little orange heart to contribute to the honouring of, and commitment to reconciliation and continued dialogue about residential schooling. We shared the story written by Phyllis Webstad, **With Our Orange Hearts.** We emphasized the importance of being kind to one another, paying tribute to the land and the ground that we learn on, and many other basic principles that promoted an age-appropriate understanding of this very important lesson. The kindergarten students are beginning to gain an understanding that Orange Shirt Day is about far more than the shirt, yet rather a symbol that is worn to let others know that 'Every Child Matters."

Grade 1

This week the students in Ms. Siddiqui-Malik's class have been learning about both the sorrow of residential schools and the joys and traditions of some First Nations communities. Students read the book "Phyllis' Orange Shirt" and learned about Phyllis Webstad's story. They discussed why we now have Truth and Reconciliation Day and wear orange shirts to remember.

On Friday, students read the Book "Trudy's Healing Stone" by Trudy Spiller who is part of the Gitzsan Nation in British Columbia. Her story shares a tradition of going into nature and looking for a stone when you feel angry, sad or blue. Children are encouraged to share their worries with the stone and keep it with them wherever they go. Once they feel ready, whether days, months or years, they are encouraged to return the stone to nature.

Our class then went out into nature and found our own healing stones. We also spent time talking about all of the ways in which trees provide for us, they give us oxygen, food, shelter, shade and many useful things made from wood. We ended our nature walk with a mindful meditation
