ORANGE SHIRT DAY / NATIONAL DAY OF TRUTH & RECONCILIATION

It's a day to honour children that survived residential school, and to remember the lives that were lost. Wearing orange is a symbol of respect and mourning. **SAFETY CAUTION**: Most of our students walk to school and there is high traffic in the school circular drive from 8:30-8:40 am. The parking lot is also extremely busy with students at the start of school and the end of the day, prior to dismissal.

Please be patient and exercise extreme caution as you drive through the school.

SCHOOL ORGANIZATION

Please keep in mind that there are many factors that are considered when creating class assignments. Many factors such as Ministry cap sizes, achievement levels, learning styles, gender, etc. are taken into account.

Balancing many of these factors is no small feat and staff have worked tirelessly at the end of last year to carefully place your child. As a school, class lists are created with consideration of the needs of ALL students and how the class and school will function as a whole. These class lists are tentative, and changes may be necessary as we remain compliant with Ministry parameters. Principals must comply with the school organization that has been approved by the Board. If changes affect your child(ren), you will be informed.

SNACK FORMS

If you would like your child to be given a snack, we require you come to complete the **Snack Program Permission Form**. Please note that **NO** child will be given a snack unless this form has been completed and returned. A separate form should be submitted for each child in the family. This form will be sent home with your child by his/her homeroom teacher.

STUDENTS GOING HOME AT LUNCH

Students who choose to go home at lunch are asked to please complete the permission forms that will be sent home with your child. A separate form should be submitted for each child in the family. This form will be sent home with your child by his/her homeroom teacher.

Please return the signed Snack and Lunch forms to your child's teacher no later than Sept. 12th.

Cell Phone/Mobile Device Use

We would like to inform you about a new policy that has been implemented across all Toronto District School Board (TDSB) schools.

As per PPM 128, the use of cell phones is no longer permitted during school hours. This policy change aims to enhance the learning environment and ensure students remain focused on their studies.

Research shows that cell phones can be a significant distraction in the classroom, leading to decreased attention and academic performance. Additionally, limiting phone use helps to promote face-to-face interactions and reduces the potential for cyberbullying during school hours. By removing these distractions, we are committed to fostering a more engaging and supportive educational experience for all students.

Please encourage your child to leave their phone at home or keep it stored in their backpack throughout the school day.

SEPTEMBER 30TH MARKS ORANGE SHIRT DAY & THE NATIONAL DAY OF TRUTH AND RECONCILIATION

September 30th is Orange Shirt Day, it also marks National Day of Truth and Reconciliation, which was passed by legislation last summer to become a federal statutory holiday.

Established in 2013, Orange Shirt Day was inspired by Phyllis Webstad, who was excited to wear her new orange shirt to her first day of school in 1973. However, when she arrived at St. Joseph Mission Residential School, her shirt was taken and never returned. From that day forward, the colour orange, for Phyllis, reminded her of that moment, how her feelings didn't matter, how she felt like she wasn't worth anything and that no one cared for the children who were crying about it that day.

Now, on this day, we recognize the legacy and impact of the residential schools system on First Nations, Métis and Inuit families and communities. We acknowledge the legacy of residential schools in Canada by wearing orange and we honour the survivors. We remember the thousands of children who were murdered and buried in unmarked graves.

On Monday, September 30, 2023, wear orange to participate in Orange Shirt Day.

Also, for the safety and well-being of your child, it is critical that the school has your child's information on file,

particularly **updated contact information** and **emergency contacts**. Carefully review and fill the student information forms as soon as possible. We thank you in advance for your co-operation.

PARENT COUNCIL

We will be offering our meetings in person and virtually for greater convenience.

ANAPHYLAXIS

Parents, we have a number of students who have a severe allergic reaction to peanuts. We ask that your child be provided with a nut-free snack and lunch when attending school. We appreciate your support.

Taking the Necessary Precautions:

Anaphylaxis is a serious allergic reaction that can be life threatening. This medical condition can cause a severe reaction to specific foods or other materials and can result in death within minutes. Although foods such as peanuts, milk, eggs, and sesame seeds are the most common cause of anaphylaxis, insect stings, medicine, or latex can also cause a reaction. In recent years, anaphylaxis has increased dramatically among students. The TDSB, in partnership with Toronto Public Health, is committed to maintaining a safe and healthy learning environment for all students and staff.

As required by Sabrina's Law, the TDSB has established policies and procedures to prevent and manage anaphylactic reactions and to reduce the risk of exposure to anaphylactic causative agents in classrooms and common school areas.

Although this may or may not affect your child's class directly, we want to raise awareness about this lifethreatening condition. Students who have severe allergies to such food substances are exposed to a severe health risk when such products are consumed in their environment or shared with them. As prevention is the best approach, we ask that you speak with your child about not sharing their snacks or lunches with other students and please do not send any snacks or lunches with your child that contain peanuts.

If your child has health problems of any kind, please inform your child's teacher or office staff immediately so that the necessary health protection steps may be taken and to ensure everyone's co-operation for a safe learning environment. CHARACTER DEVELOPMENT: A PARTNERSHIP WITH FAMILIES

With a new school year ahead, we continue to develop character in all students, and this is a shared responsibility between home and school. There is a need for family, community and schools to engage cooperatively to encourage students' learning and maturing as social beings.

Throughout the year, we will continue to focus on the 10 attributes identified at the TDSB and we encourage parents to

reinforce these attributes at home whenever possible: Respect, Responsibility, Empathy, Kindness and Caring, Teamwork, Fairness, Honesty, Co-operation, Integrity and Perseverance.

Some tips for supporting Character Development in the Home, include:

- Use the language of character development and be clear about your values
- Model and teach respectful manners
- Listen to your children and spend time with children in shared activities
- As a family, take part in community service projects or civic activities
- Establish family traditions and enjoy family celebrations together
- Teach your children to be responsible and discerning with their choices in media and entertainment and online activities
- Teach your children how to resolve conflict in a peaceful, respectful way
- Become involved in your child's school life from Kindergarten to Grade 12
- Live character every day

SEPTEMBER'S CHARACTER ATTRIBUTE:

RESPECT

Your child is involved in learning activities designed to develop good character and help children make good choices. Our focus this month will be on **RESPECT**.

What does respect mean to you?

Your child can show respect by:

- being kind to other family members
- using polite language
- talking and spending time with relatives and/or other family members
- · listening when someone else is talking

Questions to discuss with your child:

- What does it mean to be respectful?
- What are some different ways in which you can show respect: a) for yourself, b) for others, c) for nature and the environment?
- How can we speak to others with respect? Can you give some examples?
- How can we show respect for our belongings and the belongings of others?

Projects to do together:

• Watch a television show or movie together and talk about the various ways in which the characters acted respectfully

or disrespectfully toward one another. Watch for put-downs, insults, and subtle forms of bullying.

• Interview a grandparent or other relative and take the time to get to know him or her better.

• Plan how the family can do more recycling or reduce wastefulness. Organize a family project around this.

Encouraging respect in your child:

- Praise and encourage your child when he or she is being respectful.
- Speak to your child with respect and answer his or her questions in a polite manner. Expect the same behaviour from

your child.

- Share an example of how someone was respectful toward you, and how this made you feel.
- Encourage respectful manners and speaking politely to others in the community.
