# African Heritage Month:

African Heritage Month (Black History Month) provides the opportunity for students, staff and families to learn more about and celebrate Black history and to honour the legacy of Black Canadians and Black communities globally. In December 1995, the House of Commons officially recognized February as Black History Month, following a motion introduced by the first Black Canadian woman elected to Parliament, the Honourable Jean Augustine.

"TDSB's theme this year is Our Black is . . Our Black Is... Our Black Is Resilient, Community, Beautiful, Unity, Joy, Self-Determination, Excellence, Empowering, Purpose, Brilliance, Engaging, Creative, Belonging, Tenacious, Powerful, Faith, Audacious, Powerful, Me..."

As well learned about the outstanding achievements of Black Canadians in all areas of Canadian life including in science, technology, media, the arts, sports, education, law, healthcare, military services, financial services and more.



This season we had 5 athletes compete at Regionals, 3 of which made City Finals, and TWO qualified for OFSAA.

At Regionals, Jade placed 6th in his 100m breaststroke and 9th in his 50m breaststroke. James placed 5th in his 100m freestyle, 6th in his 50m breaststroke, and 12th in his 50m freestyle. Katalina placed 18th in the 50m backstroke, unfortunately, she was unable to

compete in her other events. Mila swam her hardest and finished all her events, she had an amazing season showing so much determination and improvement. Tristan had

a phenomenal season representing both the swim team and the wrestling team. He won two gold medals at Regionals where he swam 6 seconds under the OFSAA qualifying time in his 100m freestyle!! # In the Community:

Peacebuilders Canada:

The "Sister to Sister: A Healing Initiative" is a 10 week FREE Saturday afternoon program targeted towards racialized young women between the ages of 14 and 18 years old. The program is run in partnership with The Neighbourhood Group (TNG) and aims to incorporate elements of a Healing Justice framework which "holistically responds to and intervenes generational trauma and violence and bring collective practices that can impact and transform the consequences of oppression on our bodies, hearts, and mind.". Each week, through art, journaling, dialogue and movement, young women will restoratively explore topics such as identity, self-love, mental health and wellness, stress management, and generational trauma. The program will be held in person at the TNG's Central Neighbourhood House located at 349 Ontario Street.
