ambassadors of our school's outstanding arts program. We are proud of their participation in this show and look forward to supporting our students in future artistic endeavors.




Experiential Learning at CTS (CO-OP):

Experiential learning is an engaged learning process whereby students "learn by doing" and by reflecting on the experience. Well-planned, supervised and assessed experiential learning programs can stimulate academic inquiry by promoting interdisciplinary learning, civic engagement, career development, cultural awareness, leadership, and other professional and intellectual skills. Our students are engaging in work experiences all over the GTA. Some are at schools, bakeries, auto shops, fitness centres, bookstores and hospitals.

Hospitality Program:

Our Hospitality program has been hard at work, fulfilling catering orders for Board events, Superintendent meetings, school meetings and other school events. As well, the SHSM class hosted CTA for a morning of learning the business side of the restaurant business and as well they taught the students some cooking skills. Math:

CTS's grade 9 math students used coding rover robots to investigate relationships between internal and external angles of polygons. Our students worked through a series of tiered challenges coding the movements of the rover robot to draw increasingly complex polygons. They needed to discover relationships between the angles at vertices of polygons to code the correct movements of the rover.

Reimagining Learning at CTS Update:



Our students involved with the Vision and Mission project at CTS, traveled to Microsoft in the CIBC Square building and the Centre for Social Innovation. The spaces inspired the students to be creative and innovative in their thinking. Students have engaged with data analysis and clustering of ideas to frame the problem, and used causal modeling and Pro-Pro charts, to navigate tensions and determine their leverage points. We are now in the final stages of developing the Vision and Mission! Students and staff have co-edited and soon it will be shared with the entire CTS community! These students are going to make a tremendous impact on current and future students of CTS!


Session #1: May 17th, 2023: What is consent? What is an unhealthy vs. healthy relationship?
