

Haudenosaunee: kérhite/karón:ta (courtesy of *Mohawk Language Learning Resources*)

Wendat: yaronta' (courtesy of the English-Wendat Dictionary)

Library Learning Commons:

On April 24, Theola Ross spoke to students from various NBE (English: Understanding Contemporary First Nations, Métis, and Inuit Voices) classes in the CTS Library Learning Commons. Ross is a 2Spirit Cree Language Carrier, filmmaker, and scholar who presents in schools to educate students on Indigenous health, history, and systemic barriers through





storytelling.

During her visit to CTS, Ross showed her documentary *Twilight Dancers*, a film about a group of Indigenous teenagers from Pimicikamak Cree Nation who use square dancing to help heal from the trauma of a suicide epidemic in their remote Manitoba community.

On April 23rd, CTS proudly hosted the first ever West Toronto Canada Teams Mathematics Contest (CTMC) event. The CTMC is an exciting and challenging competition where participants work in teams to showcase their mathematical problem-solving skills

through fun and engaging activities (more info <u>here</u>). We were thrilled to have 10 schools participate in the competition, including Central Tech, and we are incredibly grateful for the opportunity to provide this collaborative math experience for students in Grades 9 through 12. A big thank you to our incredible group of student volunteers. We were truly impressed by the bright, kind, and caring Grade 9 and 10 students who stepped up and represented CTS so well.

Student Vote:

On Friday, April 25th Central Tech students participated in a mock election to vote for a Member of Parliament in our riding of University-Rosedale. Students were given a glimpse of what it would be like to vote and participate in the democratic process with real ballots, voting



screens, and ballot boxes. We were fortunate enough to have the event covered by <u>CBC</u> <u>Kids News</u> and <u>Civix</u>. Students chose to elect incumbent Chrystia Freeland to represent them in Parliament.

GEMS:

The GEMS (Girls Empowering Muslims Sisters) group has initiated donations for the prayer room (room 136) such as hijabs, prayer beads, pillows, a shoe rack, and more in hopes to help Muslim students and staff at CTS have a more comfortable place to practice their faith, especially during the weekly friday congregational prayers (Jummah). They are continuing to accept any donations of items for the prayer room - you can bring donations to room 211.

Earth Month:



During the month of April, as a celebration of Earth Day many of our Geography students participated in an outside school clean-up. This month students focused on ways they can do their part for the environment, relating to energy conservation, buying their food locally, using a refillable water bottle and bags, eating less meat, etc.

They're learning to make sustainable decisions for generations to come.

Grade 11 Chemistry:

Students in Ms. Spizzirri's Grade 11 Chemistry classes traveled to UofT campus and participated in a day of learning and labs. The day began with a panel of graduate and undergraduate students, a lecture about sustainable chemistry from a UofT professor, and ended



with three experiments in the state of the art UofT labs. Students applied their understanding of plastic polymers to test, identify and synthesize plastics using infrared spectroscopy and other undergraduate science lab techniques. Throughout the day, students reflected on everyday sustainability practices as well as developmental technologies they could potentially research in their post secondary studies, all while getting a taste of studying science after high school. SickKids Workshop:

Science students from Ms. Filip, Mr. Gorcey, Mr. McGreal and Ms. Spizzirri's classes participated in a workshop led by Resident Doctors from SickKids Hospital . Students learned how to cast patients and participated in medical trivia with topics ranging from Mental Health to Drug facts.

Street Art Workshop:

On April 11, a vibrant one-day Street Art Workshop brought together 2SLGBTQ+ and high school Visual Art students from Central Technical School, Central Toronto Academy, and Etobicoke School of the Arts to explore the power of community through street art. Led by professional street artist and animator Morgan Kagesheongai from StreetARToronto, students learned how to spray paint, design large-scale works, and use mural-making as a powerful form of creative expression. Working collaboratively, they each created a 4x4-foot mural inspired by the theme The Power of COMMUNITY—to unite, inspire, and reflect our shared experiences. The event was not only a celebration of queer identity and creativity but also a space for connection, learning, and self-expression.



Their finished murals will be showcased at the <u>PACE</u> (*Promoting Arts, Community, and Entrepreneurship*) event at STACKT Market on May 15, highlighting the artistic and entrepreneurial talents of TDSB students.

Formal Final Evaluations:

Starting as early as **May 20th**, classes will start their Final Evaluations in their different classes (dependent on the class). **Attendance is super important** as this is the **final opportunity** for students to provide evidence of their knowledge and skills of the Overall expectations for the different courses. As well, the Final Evaluation is made up of different components worth 30% of the grade. Please ensure your student understands the timelines and the expectations each of their teachers have of them.

May 20th - June 17th: In-class final evaluations - ATTENDANCE VERY IMPORTANT.

Accommodations will not be provided to students who miss class during this time (for travel, skipping, etc).

June 12th - June 17th: moratorium - no field trips, inter-school activities, no tests/projects of new content

Formal Final Evaluation Period:

Please note, students only come into school if they have a scheduled formal final evaluation on these dates. Formal final evaluations will only occur in the AM.

June 18th - Day 1, Period 1 (AM) June 19th - Day 1, Period 2 (AM) June 20th - Day 1, Period 3 (AM) June 23rd - Day 1, Period 4 (AM) June 24th - Inclement weather day, and make-up day for students. *** Not all courses are using these days for the Final Evaluations.

School Cash Online:

Register for School Cash Online, an easy to use, safe and convenient way for parents/guardians to pay for their children's school fees, including agendas, yearbooks and class trips. All school fees applicable to your child will be posted on School Cash Online. Once you register, you can choose to purchase the items or activities using a debit or credit card. You will be able to see when the school has a new item posted online for purchase and you will also have the option to be notified whenever your child has a new school event requiring payment. To register for School Cash Online, please visit <u>https://tdsb.schoolcashonline.com</u> select "Get Started Today" and complete the three registration steps. If you have questions about the registration process or using School Cash Online, please select the "Get Help" option on the top of School Cash Online web page. Step 1: Register

a) If you have not registered, please go to the School Cash Online home page <u>https://tdsb.schoolcashonline.com/</u>

and select the "Get Started Today" option.

b) Complete each of the three Registration Steps

*For Security Reasons your password, requires 8 characters,

one uppercase letter, one lowercase letter and a number.

Step 2: Confirmation Email

A registration confirmation email will be forwarded to you. Click on the link provided inside the email to confirm your email and School Cash Online account.

The confirmation link will open the School Cash Online site prompting you to sign into your account. Use the email address and password just created with your account.

Step 3: Find Student

This step will connect your children to your account.

- a) Enter the School Board Name
- b) Select the School Name
- c) Enter Your Child's First and Last Names
- d) Enter Your Child's Date of Birth
- e) Select Confirm

f) On the next page confirm that you are related to the child, check in

the Agree box and select Continue

g) Your child has been added to your account

Step 4: View Items or Add Another Student

If you have more children, select "Add Another Student" option and repeat the steps above. Five children can be added to one parent account.

If you do not wish to add additional children, select

"View Items for Students" option. A listing of available items for purchase will be displayed.
