What's Happening at CTS!



In our automotive classes students performed an electrical software diagnostic to figure out why the check engine light was intermittently triggering on. Upon inspection, students isolated the issue to the engine's valve cover gasket leaking. Students are installing the new engine valve cover gasket in the picture.

In hospitality, I was fortunate to join the class and learn how to identify flavours. Students (and myself) were given lessons on how the taste buds are stimulated by five fundamental taste sensations: sweet, salty, bitter, sour and umami. Our students were inspired by nature. These are the first watercolour paintings created by the Grade 9 Visual Arts class. After exploring how to mix colour and use different techniques, the students were asked to create their version of a cardinal feather with a special emphasis on the use of lines.

In KCW, Exploring our World, students are working to clean up the Greenhouse, and have planted some seedlings in our classroom to start journaling their progress and time. When they arrived on Monday March 28 they had begun to sprout, hurray!





The grade 11/12 specialized

art class is working in the sculpture room on the sculpting and casting of caricature portraits. It's a multi-step process which involves scaling up from the miniature, exploring form and texture with the aim of eliciting an emotional response, learning about molding and casting technologies to transfer the sculptures to a permanent state and finally, finishing to


achieve a professional quality.

Credit Rescue Days:

Credit Rescue Day will be held on Monday, April 11th and Wednesday, April 20th. The goal of credit rescue at mid-semester is to provide targeted support for those students needing to engage in activities to catch up and plan for continued support throughout the semester. No new content or assessments will be done on these days.

I was transferred to CTS after leaving my previous high school due to grades, behaviour and absences. I was skipping school, getting into trouble, and failing classes.
I remember my guidance counselor and Principal recommending CTS as they had a trades program. I remember thinking that it was the end of the line for me and that I would never be overly successful as that is the general stigma.

The program at CTS opened my eyes to the opportunities available that were previously hidden by the overshadowing thought that university was the only path that led to success. The program provided me with an outlook that I could be successful and provided me with the desire and motivation to succeed in school; math, science, etc. I went from a D student to graduating CTS with honours. I learned from Mr. Schrader and Mr. Mandros how I can apply math, sciences etc. to mean something purposeful for me.

I am working for Plan Group, a large mechanical contractor, as an Account Executive. I manage clients, estimate projects and a team of 30 HVAC technicians and plumbers. I was able to buy a house, support two children and my wife, and earn a great living. I wanted to share this with you as I can relate to what teenagers are probably feeling about the outcome of their lives after high school.
