Please speak out, reflect and act to end violence against women and girls. As teachers, parents, and community members our actions matter – let's work together to change behaviours and attitudes to end violence.


November 25 is International Day Against Violence Against Women and December 10 is International Human Rights Day.

This campaign provides an opportunity for boys and men to work together to end violence against women. Education and Action kits are available from the White Ribbon.


Violence is a chosen response. Society must become more serious about ending violence against women and children. Our institutions must work and achieve equality including equal power between men and women.
