Thank you for an amazing year here at Churchill Heights P.S.



appreciative. It is usually celebrated by coming together with family and community for a feast. Traditional foods are an important aspect of the feast as they signify connection to the land and animals.

While the Archipelago of the Azores and the Archipelago of Madeira are a part of Portugal, they are simultaneously Autonomous regions which share in the Portuguese language As well, due to historic ties, various regions of the world including Macau, China and Goa and Damao, India, celebrate their Portuguese influence . 

What is the Heritage Fair?

Directed by the Ontario Heritage Fairs Association (OHFA), Heritage Fair is a multi-media initiative created to raise public awareness and interest in Canadian history, geography and heritage. It highlights the learning and inquiry process, while engaging students in a fun, informative way. Heritage fair is a learning environment that consists of Three levels: Regionals, Provincials, and Nationals.

What did the Students of Churchill Heights experience?

The Grade 7s and 8s involved in this event truly had a one of a kind experience. Faced against dozens of wonderful projects, each exploring a different Canadian theme, the students found interest in a variety of other student's topics and ideas.

As students presented their topics to the judges, many found that the inquiry and research process were underlined more than actual facts. This correlates with the meaning of Heritage Fair which is the opportunity for students to share and showcase their research skills about Canadian history, geography and heritage in a fun, creative way.

Many students reported that Heritage Fair was truly an exciting opportunity to be a part of, and that they were glad to join in on the fun. The students were able to participate in workshops and discover more about Canadian themes and heritage. The students of Churchill Heights were able to learn, apply, and extend their knowledge about Canadian Heritage.

How did Students Interact with teachers & judges?

The student body at the Toronto Regional Fair had a lot to learn from the event. The judges at George Brown College helped students to share all of their findings and knowledge from their project using interviews. Everyone had opportunities to present their projects to the judges and teachers at the fair which covered a wide range of topics, from the significance of immigration from several countries in Canada to First Nations inequalities and crises throughout history.

Six students from Churchill Heights moved on to the Provincial celebratory ranking. On Saturday, May 27th, these students celebrated their accomplishments with a trip, organized by the Ontario Heritage Fair Association represented by Carol White. They got to visit the Royal Ontario Museum and share their discoveries from their projects with other schools, which was directed by Professor Rose Fine-Meyer from OISE (Ontario Institute for Studies in Education). At the OISE Centre, Professor JJ Lee, a special guest speaker from OCAD University, spoke about her family connections to Canadian heritage and history. It was really a fun and impactful day!

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
