FIRST DAY OF SCHOOL

Whether you are virtual or in person, the first day of class is Wednesday September 7, 2022 at 9:15am, OUR SCHOOL DAY is 9:15am – 3:45pm. Lunch is 12:00 – 1:00pm.

CLASSROOM TEACHER

Over the next few days your child's classroom teacher will be reaching out to you to introduce themselves to your family. Please make note of the teacher's name and room number so that your child may line up in the correct line on Wednesday September 7, 2022. This will make for an efficient entry on the first day of school.

TRANSPORTATION

Transportation will once again be using a phased approach to transportation to start the school year. Special needs students will receive service starting on Wednesday September 7th while all other eligible students will start on Monday September 12th pending driver availability. At this time, our bus companies have indicated a shortage of drivers so communications will be sent out over the next week and half to keep all parties apprised of the situation. Families are encouraged to sign up for an account on the transportation portal so you can keep updated on transportation news pertaining to your children.

COVID-19 HEALTH AND SAFETY MEASURES AND PRACTICES

Over the past 30 months, TDSB staff have been diligent in following the health and safety directions provided by the Ministry of Education and Toronto Public Health to manage COVID-19 and keep our school as safe as possible. Earlier this month, the Ministry of Education released its guidance for the new school year. They have stated that schools will begin the year in the same way that we ended last year, with only the most necessary COVID-19 measures in place. We continue to take our health and safety direction from the Ministry and Toronto Public Health and it is important to note that this is the current information and can change based on a change of guidance.

Screening – Students and staff should continue to do a daily self-assessment before entering school and stay home if they are sick. We are awaiting an updated screening tool from the Ministry and will share as soon as it is available.

Masks – The TDSB continues to be a mask-friendly environment inclusive of all staff and students. While the Ministry of Education and public health officials are not mandating the use of masks, Toronto Public Health strongly recommends wearing a well-fitting, high quality mask, especially in indoor public settings. The TDSB will continue to provide medical masks for staff and students who request them.

HANDWASHING

- Students should wash their hands regularly with soap in either warm or cold water.
- In classrooms where there are sinks, this can be done within the class.
- Classrooms are equipped with liquid soap and paper towels to support hand drying.
- Hand sanitizer will be provided by the school for all classrooms without sinks.

WATER FOUNTAINS

- Toronto Public Health recommends that water fountains are not to be used to drink water but might be used to fill water bottles.
- Students are encouraged to carry individual refillable water bottles to come filled from home. Students can use our water filling station near the gym to fill their water bottle if required.

LUNCH TIME

- Any students who go home for lunch or who are permitted to go out for lunch off school property would be expected to remain off property until just before afternoon entry.
- Students who have performed the active screening in the morning do not need to be actively screened again upon re-entry during the day. They should be given the opportunity to practice hand hygiene at re-entry by using alcohol hand sanitizer.

ANAPHYLAXIS

Taking the Necessary Precautions

Anaphylaxis is a serious allergic reaction that can be life threatening. This medical condition can cause a severe reaction to specific foods or other materials and can result in death within minutes. Although foods such as peanuts, milk, eggs, and sesame seeds are the most common cause of anaphylaxis, insect stings, medicine, or latex can also cause a reaction. In recent years, anaphylaxis has increased dramatically among students. The TDSB, in partnership with Toronto Public Health, is committed to maintaining a safe and healthy learning environment for all students and staff.

As required by Sabrina's Law, the TDSB has established policies and procedures to prevent and manage anaphylactic reactions and to reduce the risk of exposure to anaphylactic causative agents in classrooms and common school areas.

Although this may or may not affect your child's class directly, we want to raise awareness about this life-threatening condition. Students who have severe allergies to such food substances are exposed to a severe health risk when such products are consumed in their environment or shared with them. As prevention is the best approach, we ask that you speak with your child about not sharing their snacks or lunches with other students and please do not send any snacks or lunches with your child that contain peanuts.

If your child has health problems of any kind, please inform your child's teacher or office staff immediately so that the necessary health protection steps may be taken and to ensure everyone's co-operation for a safe learning environment. CHARACTER DEVELOPMENT: A PARTNERSHIP WITH FAMILIES

With a new school year ahead, we continue to develop character in all students, and this is a shared responsibility between home and school. There is a need for family, community and schools to engage cooperatively to encourage students' learning and maturing as social beings.

Throughout the year, we will continue to focus on the 10 attributes identified at the TDSB and we encourage parents to reinforce these attributes at home whenever possible: Respect, Responsibility, Empathy, Kindness and Caring, Teamwork, Fairness, Honesty, Co-operation, Integrity and Perseverance.

Some tips for supporting Character Development in the Home, include:

- Use the language of character development and be clear about your values
- Model and teach respectful manners
- Listen to your children and spend time with children in shared activities
- As a family, take part in community service projects or civic activities
- Establish family traditions and enjoy family celebrations together
- Teach your children to be responsible and discerning with their choices in media and entertainment and online activities
- Teach your children how to resolve conflict in a peaceful, respectful way
- Become involved in your child's school life from Kindergarten to Grade 12
- Live character every day

SEPTEMBER'S CHARACTER ATTRIBUTE:

RESPECT

*Your child is involved in learning activities designed to develop good character and help children make good choices. Our focus this month will be on **RESPECT**.*

What does respect mean to you?

Your child can show respect by:

- being kind to other family members
- using polite language
- talking and spending time with relatives and/or other family members
- listening when someone else is talking

Questions to discuss with your child:

- What does it mean to be respectful?
- What are some different ways in which you can show respect: a) for yourself, b) for others, c) for nature and the environment?
- How can we speak to others with respect? Can you give some examples?
- How can we show respect for our belongings and the belongings of others?

Projects to do together:

- Watch a television show or movie together and talk about the various ways in which the characters acted respectfully or disrespectfully toward one another. Watch for put-downs, insults, and subtle forms of bullying.
- Interview a grandparent or other relative and take the time to get to know him or her better.
- Plan how the family can do more recycling or reduce wastefulness. Organize a family project around this.

Encouraging respect in your child:

- Praise and encourage your child when he or she is being respectful.
- Speak to your child with respect and answer his or her questions in a polite manner. Expect the same behaviour from your child.
- Share an example of how someone was respectful toward you, and how this made you feel.
- Encourage respectful manners and speaking politely to others in the community.

Dear Families,

The Toronto Student Transportation Group (TSTG) would like to provide an update on student transportation for September 2022.

Phased-in Start

As the school year begins, the TSTG will once again implement a phased-in start for student transportation to provide a more consistent service for families and to ensure that students with special education needs are prioritized to receive bus service beginning the first week of school. Both the TDSB and TCDSB will be following this phased-in start.

From September 7 to 9 –students with special education needs (excluding those in the gifted program) who travel to school on minibuses, minivans, taxis and wheelchair-accessible vehicles will be provided with student transportation.

From September 7 to 9 – students at relocation schools, specific buses for new Canadians, The Island Public school, and those at Wandering Spirit will also be provided with transportation services.

From September 12 – all other eligible students will be provided with student transportation unless there are concerns with driver availability.

Driver Availability

As bus operators continue to face a province-wide driver shortage, the phased-in approach also provides TSTG with additional time to identify and address any potential issues so that when full transportation services are in place, they can run as smoothly as possible.

Throughout the summer, we have been in constant communication with our carriers who have provided ongoing driver status updates. Currently, new drivers are being trained so they are ready for the start of the new school year. At this point, we have been advised that approximately 20 routes (1% of our total routes) do not have drivers assigned to them. In addition, there is also a shortage of approximately 80 backup/spare drivers. We anticipate that the number of routes without a driver will decrease as these new drivers complete their training.

We will continue to work closely with all bus operators in the coming days to confirm driver availability for the start of school. Should driver availability impact service in September, we will update families as soon as possible.



COVID-19 Protocols

Numerous safety precautions maintained during the pandemic will remain in place during school bus transportation.

Please remember that if your child is ill, please keep them at home – as a reminder, bus carriers will maintain this message. Weather permitting, bus windows will be open to allow for air circulation. Students will continue to be assigned seats. Our bus carriers will continue to maintain an accelerated cleaning protocol to ensure a safe environment.
