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November was Indigenous Education Month in the Toronto District School Board

As our school moves forward with the learning and understanding of our place on Indigenous lands and our relationship with our First Nations peoples, we are beginning to embark on creating meaningful and personalized Land Acknowledgments. Our land acknowledgment is read at the beginning of each day to recognize and pay tribute to those who continue to share their land with us. As part of our growth practice, Mme. Goumakos will help lead our staff in how to authentically and intentionally create classroom land acknowledgements that are reflective of our students and their voices.

In the French Immersion Kindergarten B class in room 214, the students were wondering what was being said on the announcements every day and why? In particular, the students were inquiring about the land acknowledgement and so we decided to make it more accessible and meaningful for the early learners. Over the course of the first few weeks of school, we did a lot of work learning about our school environment and the beings that make up our school community. We started to learn more about the word 'Indigenous' and Indigenous Peoples. We brainstormed ideas of what we do at school and put our version of the land acknowledgement together, still honouring and respecting the one that has been created alongside Indigenous Peoples for the TDSB. We continue to learn together as a class and school community to engage in Truth and Reconciliation.

How do you make Land Acknowledgments meaningful?

How to do a Land Acknowledgment - Teaching & Learning - Trent University

Knowing how to deliver a meaningful land acknowledgement takes some thought and practice. Below are a few tips intended to help those creating a land acknowledgement for the first time:

1. Before beginning work on your land acknowledgment statement, reflect on what your goal is (e.g. to inspire others to take action in supporting Indigenous communities). Developing a land acknowledgment simply because "everyone else is doing it," is a sign that perhaps further self-reflection is in order.

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- 2. Ensure that you are well informed by researching the following:
 - The Indigenous people to whom the land is home for.
 - The pre and post settlement history of the land as well as related treaties.
 - Indigenous words and phraseologies including correct pronunciation for the names of nations, communities, places, and individuals.
 - Existing relationships between you/your department and local Indigenous people, groups, or organizations.
- 3. Contemplate the language you will use in your land acknowledgement statement:
 - Use appropriate identifying terms such as First Nations, Métis, and Inuit, rather than antiquated designations (e.g. Indian, native, etc.)
 - Use terms like colonization, settler, assimilation, and stolen land to highlight actions taken in the past that have disrupted Indigenous wellbeing.
 - Use past, present, and future tenses thoughtfully. Indigenous people are still here - they are not a remnant of the past.

Salle 214 Land Acknowledgement

Today we play, learn and go outside on the land of the Mississaugas of the Anishinaabe, the Haugenosaunee Confederacy and the Wendat. We help to care for nature, the plants, the animals, each other and the land.

Mrs. Serebrin's Land Acknowledgement

We acknowledge that we are living on unceded traditional territory. We thank the First Peoples on whose traditional lands allow us to teach, learn and live. We understand that we share our living with families that have yet to recover from the past of their people, and as visitors to this land, we the support the efforts of all Tribes in their healing, as we remember and honour those whos presence - past, and future - we respect. As we support and foster the learning through the sharing of knowledge, we the history that brought us to where we are today. We are grateful for the many opportunities that this privilege affords us.

Reflection: Land acknowledgments are a steppingstone to honouring the broken treaty relationships. I am not Indigenous, rather I am of settler-colonial ancestry. Although my heritage extends to England, France, Ireland, Russia and Scotland, I-like many other settler people - have benefited greatly from living on the Land of the First Peoples. As a visitor on this land, I have an important responsibility to acknowledge the grounds on which we are privileged to gather in the pursuit of higher education.

This year we will also have an amazing opportunity to virtually view the resources at our Book Fair and purchase them from the comfort of your home.



NEWS TO MOVE TO!

Mindful Moment

It is very important that we move our bodies intentionally and focus on being active throughout the day. <u>Hold, Melt, and Move</u> is an activity that can help the entire family engage in an active mindful moment.

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<u>Hold:</u> Begin by choosing a static position, such as sitting, standing, squat position, any accessible yoga pose, an animal pose, or superhero pose. Try to stay still and hold your pose for 8 seconds. Count 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 and stop!

<u>Melt:</u> Now you are going to pretend that you are melting, and you are going to allow your pose to dissolve for 8 seconds. Start melting down to the ground and let your pose dissolve! You should be melting for about 8 seconds. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8. And stop melting!

<u>Move</u>: Get up from your melting position and move in your spot for 8 seconds. You can jump, do jumping jacks, run in your spot, and more. Ready? Countdown from 3 and move in your spot for 8 seconds. 3, 2, 1, now MOVE! 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8. Now stop!

ECO- CORNER – The Greenest Corner in the Room

This month in eco club we have been working on making **G.O.O.S.** paper bins and posters primarily using repurposed materials. Wondering what **G.O.O.S.** stands for? If you guessed, **Good On One Side**, then you guessed correctly.

Paper is a huge contributor to everyday waste and we are trying to divert as much as possible in our school. The students surveyed all of the classes and rooms in the school and made G.O.O.S. paper bins for the places that don't have one.
