

#### **Attention Grade 11's**

### **Summer School and Credit Recovery Registration and End Dates**

<u>Credit recovery (virtual) summer school registration will close on June 28 @ 4pm</u>. If students are at risk of failing a course after all forms of credit rescue have been applied, students are encouraged to register for summer credit recovery, in our guidance office. A reminder that the last day of credit rescue is on June 27.

#### What is the difference between Credit Rescue and Credit Recovery?

Credit Rescue is a last chance to hand in or complete an evaluation from term work only (not a final evaluation like an exam or a final culminating activity) that will enable a student to pass the course and hence "rescue" the credit. Please note, that this is a chance to rescue the credit with an opportunity to do an assignment, project or possibly a supervised evaluation that will bring a student from a failing mark to a passing mark. Students in these situations may have marks just below 50% - usually in the 45% to 49% range. Teachers will speak to a student throughout the course and especially on the credit rescue day (end of exams) on any work that can help them be successful in achieving the credit.

Marks much lower will require the student(s) to demonstrate their learning for the expectations missed/not demonstrated. In these cases where the mark is too low, the student will have an option to demonstrate these expectations in a <u>credit recovery course</u>, which are offered in summer school and in day school. Please see below for more information about Credit Recovery.

Credit Recovery will be a series of projects/work or one large project that will be completed in a Credit Recovery Course. The teacher who taught the student in day school, will provide a list or summary of what areas or expectations were not demonstrated by the student during the whole semester. The student will complete these areas and "recover" the credit which will then replace the failed course. In many instances the student can demonstrate their learning and recover the credit with a much higher mark, once all the work is submitted. In the summer, students can recover the credit by completing the work as soon as possible, and not have to spend the entire month in summer school. However, if the mark is quite low, they may have to work most of the month to make up the expectations missed. In some cases, it may be best for the student to repeat the entire course to ensure all expectations of the course are met, and the student is best prepared for the next grade level.

**Please note** there is only summer credit recovery during the month of July – there is NO credit recovery in TDSB for the month of August.

**Please also note** that students enrolling in credit recovery must have a mark below 50%. Students cannot take a credit recovery course to increase a mark that is over 50% e.g. a student who had a mark of 65% in ENG4U and wants to increase it to over 80%, cannot take credit recovery to do this. In that case – they would need to re-do the course which can be done in e-Learning summer school (August only registration now).

An e-Learning or virtual summer school is an entire month of school that meets the expectations of a 110-hour course.

*Please note* that virtual summer school is also only in July. Please speak to a guidance counselor for more information on sites.
