The week wrapped up with a Family Literacy Kahoot game and character dress up day. We would like to thank our Literacy Committee for their creativity and for planning all of these wonderful events! We are looking forward to planning more events as the school year continues.

This month Switch Requests will be approved and students who are switching from virtual learning to in-person learning or in-person learning to virtual learning will begin in their new classes on Tuesday, February 22nd, following Family Day. As well, due to a decrease in our staffing, we have reorganized some of our Grade 1-3 classes. Parents have already been notified if their child's class is affected by this reorganization and all changes will come into effect on Tuesday, February 22nd. Thank you to our families as we worked through these changes and switch requests.

Travelling To and From School

Thank you to the many families who have been walking with their children to and from school. With the back field and our pathways finally open behind the school, this has made travelling back

and forth to school so much easier and faster for our families, even in the conditions. snowy This also helps to reduce traffic congestion around our school during drop off and pick up times which can help to make drop off and pick up go more smoothly in our



parking lots and surrounding streets.

Remember, <u>please do to not park in the bus</u> <u>loading zone on Highbrook Drive as our school</u> <u>buses need to use this zone to drop off and pick up</u> <u>students. Parking in this zone is illegal.</u> As well, <u>parking is only legal on the side of street closest to</u> <u>the school. Parking on the other side, is illegal and</u> <u>also causes issues with the flow of traffic on</u> <u>Highbrook Drive.</u>

We understand that traffic congestion can be frustrating, however if you choose to drive instead of walking, parents are expected to act responsibly (following safety expectations and the laws of the road) and respectfully with each other, especially when you find yourself stuck in traffic around the school or in our parking lot. You need to expect congestion during both drop off and pick up times at the school, as these are the busiest time of the school day for traffic. Be patient, expect delays if you are driving and do not block the street or the parking lot for others. Our staff assists in guiding traffic each day and with time and patience we are able to guide everyone in and out of our pick up and drop off zones.

We continue to work in partnership with Toronto Police Services and our local Traffic Enforcement Officers to assist with congestion and safety on the roadways surrounding the school.

Health and Safety Protocols

Health and safety protocols continue to be important to keep everyone safe while at school. These include the following:

- -The importance of social distancing from others as much as possible
- -Wearing a mask at school and changing it if it becomes dirty or wet
- -Proper hand hygiene (washing and sanitizing)

**It is of the utmost importance that parents/guardians screen each of their children <u>every morning</u> before they come to school and sign their Health Pass each day. <u>If your child is sick or is</u> <u>displaying any of the COVID-19 symptoms, you must</u> <u>keep them at home</u>.

students at our school in September! Thank you to



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The first Black Canadian woman elected to Parliament, the Honourable Jean Augustine,


introduced a motion to recognize February as Black History Month. The motion was carried unanimously by the House of Commons. In December 1995, the House of Commons officially recognized February as Black History Month in Canada. At the Toronto District School Board, a motion to recognize African Heritage (Black History) Month was carried in January 2002 and reaffirmed again in January 2004.

February is Chinese Heritage Month

This year Chinese Heritage Month coincides with one of the most important Chinese celebrations, the Lunar New Year which began on Tuesday, February 1st. Lunar New Year is also known as the spring festival and begins with the first new moon of the lunar calendar and ends on the first full moon of the

lunar calendar 15 days later. This year's theme is YEAR OF THE TIGER– Brave, Compassionate, Adventurous, and Optimistic.

During the month of February, several activities will be shared to mark CHM. All students and



staff were invited to share their stories through the Chinese Canadian Memory Minute initiative (video link to be posted shortly). To learn about Chinese Heritage a <u>power point</u> was created highlighting the symbolism for various foods that are shared at festivals celebrated by Chinese Canadians. Further a Kahoot Trivia challenge was developed by CHM members for students to explore their Chinese heritage knowledge and this was shared with our classroom teachers.
