In addition to parent-teacher interviews, you can request a meeting at any time during the school year by contacting the school or your child's teacher directly.



Travelling To and From School

to and from school this school year. With the back field and our pathways finally open behind the school, this has made travelling back and forth to school so much easier and faster for our families. This has also helped to reduce traffic congestion around our school during drop off and pick up times which has made drop off and pick



up go more smoothly in our parking lots and surrounding streets.

Remember, do not park in the bus loading zone on Highbrook Drive as our school buses need to use this zone to drop off and pick up students. Parking We know that traffic in this zone is illegal. congestion can be frustrating for parents, however if you choose to drive instead of walking, parents are expected to act responsibly and respectfully with each other, especially when they are stuck in traffic around the school or in our parking lot. You need to expect congestion during both drop off and pick up times at the school, as these are the busiest time of the school day for traffic. We continue to work in partnership with Toronto Police Services and our local Traffic Enforcement Officers to assist with congestion and safety on the roadways surrounding the school. Please ensure you are adhering to the signs posted and the laws of the road.

Punctuality

Learning to be punctual is a skill that students **must** develop in order to be successful at school. It is disruptive for students and



teachers when students arrive late to class. Valuable learning takes place at the very beginning of the morning and afternoon that tardy students miss.

Students that arrive in class after 8:45 a.m. and/or 12:35 p.m. are late. If students are consistently late, the classroom teachers and/or office staff will be following up with parents. If the student continues to arrive at school late, or there are frequent absences (10+), a letter will be sent home to parents from the Principal to further address this area of concern.

Please remember to call 416-396-6200 or 416-396-6201 to report students' late arrivals and absences.

It is important that parents call the school when a student will

be late or absent from school.

If your child arrives to school late (after 8:45 a.m. or 12:35 p.m.), please ensure that they go to the office to get a late slip. If your child does not check in at the office when they are late, the School Connects system will call out to your home as the teacher's attendance form will indicate that your child is absent.

Lunch Supervision

Our lunch hour is a very busy time! If parents are at home during the lunch hour we highly encourage that students go home for lunch, students are to return to school after 12:15 p.m. prior to afternoon classes. Going home at lunch time is an opportunity for students to take a break from the hustle and bustle of the school day and a chance to relax and reconnect with their family while enjoying a homemade lunch.

Bullying Awareness and Prevention Week November 15-21

Bullying Awareness and Prevention Week helps to promote safe schools and a positive learning environment. At our school we will be using this week to continue to promote a positive school climate. Daily announcements relating to bullying awareness and prevention will provide information and topics for class discussions. As well, resources will be provided to our teachers for in-class activities. Bullying Prevention/Awareness is not a week-long event, it is an ongoing discussion within our classrooms, our school and our community.

Each week we continue to remind our students of the three steps to problem solving to help them when conflicts arise.

- 1- Tell the person, "Stop! I don't like what you're doing."
- 2- If the problem continues, walk away.
- 3- If the problem still continues, go and find a staff member for help in solving the problem.

These three steps also guide our discussions with students when problems arise. They have been very helpful when students are trying to solve conflicts that occur, as well as when they are reflecting on their actions after a problem has happened.

Problem solving skills and bullying awareness/prevention are conversations that also need to happen on an ongoing basis at home. All of us have an important role in keeping our schools safe - parents, educators and students.

VRP - Volunteer Reading Program

Our Grade 1/2 Volunteer Reading Program (VRP Program) has recently started. Our VRP Volunteers are providing

<u>Stay Healthy</u> During Flu Season

Flu season is here again! In Canada, flu season tends to run between October and April. The Ontario government is

encouraging Ontarians to avoid getting sick this flu season by getting their annual flu shot.

Toronto Public Health is recommending that whenever students and staff experience flu-like symptoms, they are sent home and do not return to school until they are no longer infectious to others. Therefore, ill students and staff should be symptomfree (especially from vomiting and diarrhea) for at least 48 hours before returning to school. The primary concern is for the health and safety of all students and staff. Everyone should do their part to stop the spread of the flu. As parents, you can also assist by:


 reminding your children to wash their hands often especially after using the washroom and before and after eating;

- reminding your children to cover their sneeze and cough using their arm, not their hands;

- watching for symptoms of vomiting, diarrhea, dizziness, and/or high fever;
- informing the school if your child is ill;
- keeping your child at home when he/she is ill.
