Working Together to Ensure Student Success

In order to ensure the best possible education for your child, it is necessary for them to attend school regularly and to be on time for class. A student's

academic progress depends on regular class attendance – whether they are part of In Person or Virtual Learning. Students are expected to fully



participate in learning opportunities. Research indicates that attendance patterns and attitudes

are developed at an early age, so establishing and supporting these expectations at home is very important.

You can help ensure your child's success by:

- being involved in your child's education;
- knowing the school's schedule and ensuring that your child comes to school unless they are sick;
- communicating regularly with classroom teachers (use your child's agenda to communicate with the teacher) or send notes;
- ensuring that your child gets a good night's sleep so that they have the energy they need for the next day.

Keeping Students Safe – Street Safety

Drivers are reminded to do their part to keep children safe.

Drivers should follow these tips:

• Stop and never pass a school bus when its red lights are flashing.

• Leave space around school buses and avoid blocking school bus loading zones (*our school's bus loading zone is located on Highbrook Drive in front of the Kindergarten playground area*) so children can enter and exit safely.

• Be prepared to stop for a school bus at any time, not just during school hours.

• Always obey the rules of the road and watch for children, especially in school zones.

• Stop for pedestrians at crosswalks and school crossings.

Parents can also help keep their children safe by reminding them to be aware of their surroundings when they are around school zones which are quite busy during entry and dismissal times.

Safety Tips:

here are some basic safety rules to follow:

Children should NEVER eat any treats until parents have had a chance to go through them and inspect them. Parents should look for tampering of packages and discard any they believe to be unsafe or unknown.
Have your child carry a flashlight.

NEVER go into a stranger's house.NEVER trick or treat with people you do not know.

•Trick or treat only at homes you know. •Children should always stay in groups if no parent present. is •Younger children should ALWAYS be accompanied older by an person. •Accompany your child when trick or treating. •If you can not accompany your child then know the route vour child will take. •Flame resistant (retardant) costumes are in order. Keep costumes short and remind children to stay away from pumpkins with candles in them. •Remind children to stay away from pets they do not know.


•Remind children of road safety rules. Cross only at corners. Do not criss-cross across the road. Go up one side of the road and down the other side. Never cross between parked cars. Walk facing ontraffic if there coming is no sidewalk •If adults are driving their children, drive slowly, with lights on and be cautious when pulling to the side of the road. •Children should wear their own shoes when trick or treating. Wearing costume shoes/boots can be uncomfortable. dangerous and •Remind children that not everyone celebrates Hallowe'en, and to avoid any homes that have no lights on. Also remind children not to run through neighbours' yards or gardens. •With older children, be sure to know what other events (such as parties) they plan on attending. •Set time limits when children should return home.

Islamic Heritage Month – October 2022

The Toronto District School Board proudly recognizes Islamic Heritage Month during the month of October. This recognition follows the motion passed by the Board of Trustees on June 22, 2016.

For families interested in the Toronto District School Board's system-wide French Immersion Program, the TDSB offers an online process to apply for Early French Immersion (begins in Junior Kindergarten). An offer of placement in the program (not a specific school) is guaranteed to all on-time applicants. Families with an older sibling currently in an Early French Immersion program are still required to complete an online application for the new student. The timeline to apply to the program for September 2023 is between October 31 and November 25, 2022.

Student Valuables/ Cell Phones

Parents can always contact their child through the main office if

there is an emergency, and therefore students do not need to bring cell phones to school for calling home. Students are encouraged not to bring valuables such as cell phones, electronic devices, jewelry, as well as large quantities of money.

We realize that in some cases students may have cell phones for safety purposes (e.g, for walking home). While on school property; cell phones are to be turned off and placed out of view during the regular school day, on excursions and at extra-curricular and school related activities. Students are responsible for storing their cell phone in a secure location. It is important to understand that **students who bring cell phones and other valuables to school are doing so at their own risk**. The school is not responsible for the replacement of such items that may be damaged, stolen or lost.

Snack Program

Thank you to Mrs. Patel, our Snack Program Coordinator, who will be providing our students from Kindergarten to Grade 8 with a daily healthy morning snack. Our Snack Program has begun! Snack Program is available for any family that wishes to participate in it, you just need to complete the Snack Program form for your child to receive snack.

If you choose to send your own snack for your

child, remember that <u>many</u> <u>students and staff members</u> <u>have life-threatening</u> <u>allergies to certain foods, in</u> <u>particular nuts and nut</u> <u>products</u>. Please try to send a healthy snack for your child, such as fruits and vegetables.



PLEASE DO <u>NOT SEND NUTS OR</u> NUT PRODUCTS TO SCHOOL!

Reminder: If your child has health problems of any kind, please inform your child's teacher or office staff immediately so that the necessary health protection steps may be taken, and to ensure everyone's co-operation for a safe learning environment.

Lunch Supervision

Lunch time is a very busy time at our school! If parents are at home during the lunch hour we encourage that students go home for lunch for a

break, students are to return to school right before the entry bell rings which is at 12:30 p.m.. Going home at lunch time is an opportunity for students to take a break from the hustle and bustle of the school day and to have a chance to relax with their family while enjoying their lunch.

Steps to Problem Solving

Each week we continue to remind our students of the three steps to problem solving to help them when conflicts arise.

- 1- Tell the person, "Stop! I don't like what you're doing."
- 2- If the problem continues, walk away.
- 3- If the problem still continues, go and find a staff member for help in solving the problem.

These three steps also guide our discussions with students when problems arise. They have been very helpful when students are trying to solve conflicts that occur, as well as when they are reflecting on their actions after a problem has happened.

Problem solving skills need to be supported and worked through with our students and children on an ongoing basis at home. All of us have an important role to play in helping our students (your children) to make good decisions for both themselves and others, and to learn from their mistakes and make better choices the next time. This is an essential part of progressive discipline as well.

School Council

Parents are welcome to attend School Council meetings as often as you can. Meetings take place monthly, usually on the 1st Tuesday of each month. This school year most meetings will continue to

take place virtually, but there will be a few in person meetings as well. Suggestions to Parents to Support Boomerang Lunch:

Help your child pack their own healthy foods that they like.

Only pack as much food as you know your child will eat.

Label all containers so that lost items can be returned home.

Avoid packing drinks that cannot be resealed.
