

HELP YOUR CHILD SUCCEED IN LANGUAGE CLASSES

- Encourage your child to read every day. It doesn't matter if he/she reads a novel or a newspaper or even comic books. Regular reading not only helps your child read better, but also helps him/her write better. Reading is a great way to increase vocabulary and spelling in any language.
- Encourage your child to participate in class.
 Speaking in class helps improve confidence and gives the teacher an opportunity to offer suggestions on ways to improve pronunciation.
- Encourage your child to watch or listen to programs and music in the target language.
- Encourage your child to make friends who speak different languages.
- Encourage your child to visit stores, restaurants, etc., where people speak the target language, so they have opportunity to practice their language skills.
- Continue to speak to your child in your first language(s). Studies show that language learning is additive. This means that students learning a new language should continue to speak their first language(s).
- Make sure your child completes each and every assignment. Homework will also be regularly assigned and is an important way for students to practice their skills.
- Encourage your child to bring the proper materials to class each day: a binder with lined paper, pens, and the textbook and Chromebook.
- Do not hesitate to contact your child's teacher throughout the year, if you have any questions about the course or about your child's progress.



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
