#### **REPORTS**

#### **4.1. Student governance**: (Nardos Mekonnen)

Day of Pink (April 10<sup>th</sup>): a shirt sale took take place during the week prior to the Day and a bake sale took place on the Day; proceeds from this even will go to charity.

Wellness Week (first week of May): the Wellness Week will include therapy dogs in school, time dedicated to yoga and meditation, board games etc.

*Prom* (6-11pm, May 29<sup>th</sup>): venue: Parkview Manor; theme of "Meet me at midnight" will characterise the evening. Tickets are on sale until May 8<sup>th</sup> via School Cash online. N.B. Grad hoodies will soon be available for grade 12s.

Multicultural Night (6-8pm, May 10<sup>th</sup>): the event aims to showcase cultures represented at EYCI. There will be multicultural food sampling followed by a show in the Auditorium. Tickets are \$10. Part of the proceeds will go to charity.

Blue and Gold Day: a group of students who represent sports teams at EYCI lamented the planned cancellation of Blue & Gold Day (scheduled for May 10<sup>th</sup>). They appealed to Council to hear arguments in favour of reinstating the Day, the cancellation whereof would deny them an opportunity to demonstrate their talents to their peers, something not denied to other clubs at EYCI. A petition containing 574 student signatures which calls for Blue & Gold's reinstatement had been compiled during the days before Council's meeting.

In response, the Principal recalled the egregious events of Blue & Gold, 2023, on which day a number of interlopers came to EYCI with the apparent intention to "cause trouble". There were fights and costly acts of vandalism. The Principal has been advised, *inter alia*, by his predecessor, not to stage such an event on grounds of lack of security. The Principal stressed that events at EYCI were approved on a "safety first" principle, and he was sceptical whether he could maintain adequate safety if Blue & Gold were held as usual. He was nevertheless open to discussing ideas with the student representatives about a modified Blue & Gold Day if his safety concerns could be assuaged. A meeting, at a time to be specified, was agreed between the Principal and the student representatives.

Numerous ideas were floated by the students for making the event safer. These include making it a ticket-only event, issuing wrist bands to eligible attendees and using an external security team to monitor the event and keep order.

# **4.2. Principal**: (Stephen Morris)

Commencement: the Principal divulged the venue for Commencement, namely, the Danforth Music

Hall. Tickets, at \$15 each, would be available for up to 3 guests for each graduand. A gown and cap would be provided for graduating students, each of whom would be allowed to keep the aforesaid items *in perpetuum*.

*Library refurbishment*: the Principal recapitulated the plans to refurbish the library and the fundraising campaign surrounding the project (see his email of 19<sup>th</sup> April to the EYCI community).

*Auditorium*: a plan for a new "state-of-the-art" sound system for the Auditorium is about to be unveiled. The new system should be in place later this year or early next.

*Parking*: as the Principal had already announced by email (19<sup>th</sup> April), the parking situation has become so out of hand that he has asked the City to enforce parking by-laws in the EYCI car park. Myriad warnings were given in school to allow non-authorised parkers (especially students) to make alternative arrangements. City inspectors will be continue to monitor the parking lot and, where applicable, issue tickets henceforth.

### **4.3. Teachers' representative**: (Andrea Palmay)

Eid Celebration: a party was held on April 29th in the Meeting Room to mark Eid.

*Mini-Filmfest* (April 26<sup>th</sup>): the History Department will be screening a documentary film *Coextinction* during period 4. Teachers who have classes during that period are invited to allow their students to attend.

*Athletics*: spring sports have commenced and include girls' soccer, slo-pitch softball, baseball, rugby, badminton, lacrosse, ultimate frisbee and track & field. In track & field, EYCI qualified for the regionals. An EYCI alumna represented the school in badminton at the City Finals.

#### **4.6. Co-chairs' report**: (Nick Moutafis)
