## Why Co-op? Get the most out of co-op Mr. A.N. Persaud



Why do students apply to the co-op program year after year? What do they get out of it? For 30-plus years at East York C.I., a great deal. It's for



the same reasons that universities and colleges across Ontario are currently expanding their own co-op programs – but with a price tag attached. While in secondary school – without the hefty tuition fees – students in co-op have the chance to:

- Test drive a career;
- **Network** with workers within a particular job sector;
- Gain valuable **resume experience**;
- Earn a solid **reference** for the job-hunt;
- Learn real life **techni- cal skills** from licensed professionals;
- Build professional **communication and interpersonal skills** in interacting with supervisors, coworkers, clients and the general public;
- Build their **self-confidence** in accepting, safe and nurturing environments; and earn 2 to 4



**credits** toward completion of their *Ontario Secondary School Diploma*.

The above, however, are not automatic benefits. I recall an early programming term: "garbage in, garbage out". The same principle from computer programming applies to life. The students who come away with the most are often the ones who put in their maximum. From my years of experi-

ence as an educator in Cooperative Education, I have seen some common traits among our more successful students. These include:

- Punctuality and Attendance student travel to work has ranged from a few minutes to considerably more. Students are taught to plan their schedule to ensure
- that they arrive early for the job each and every day. Successful students do not blame their circumstances; they help to shape their circumstances.
- **Initiative** Instead of waiting around to be assigned the next task, these students learn to

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anticipate the needs of the situation and take steps to meet those needs.

• Focus and Perseverance — Successful students at co-op, as in the classroom, are able to attend well to each task, taking in instruction and information and applying it. Sticking with a particular assignment until completion also allows these students to apply patience,



flexibility and problem solving skills while learning more completely.

• Enthusiasm — Enthusiasm makes possible the above listed traits. Our more enthusiastic coop students are hungry for knowledge and experience and open themselves to the various learning opportunities at their placement.
