
Did you know: about Summer Solstice?

While Summer Solstice is widely known for being the longest day and the shortest night of the year, during National Indigenous History Month the TDSB highlights that June 21st means much more to many First Nations, Métis and Inuit peoples.

This year, June 21st, 2023 marks the national 27th anniversary of celebrating the heritage, diverse cultures and outstanding achievements of First Nations, Inuit and Métis peoples. Throughout history and across continents, Summer Solstice brings multi-disciplinary arts festivals and programs that share knowledge and celebrate Canada's diverse Indigenous cultures.

It is a time that reminds people to remain grounded, humble and appreciative. It is usually celebrated by coming together with family and community for a feast. Traditional foods are an important aspect of the feast as they signify connection to the land and animals
