## COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course requires students to put together and perform dramatic presentations that deal with a variety of issues from the past and present. Students will analyze, interpret, and perform works of drama from various cultures. Students will also do research on different acting styles and conventions for their presentation, create original works, and analyze the functions of playwright, director, actor, technician and audience. Grade 11 students experience a transition year from drama for the purpose of self-development, to drama for development and communication with an audience. We will be building on the skills that you learned in previous courses as well as develop acting skills with the objective of a production at the end of the semester. Grade 12 students will take on a leadership role in the class, focusing on directing experiences alongside acting experiences, and will also prepare a research paper that reflects on a historical play and its significance and contribution to modern society.
