Theories, Perspectives, and Methodologies: demonstrate an understanding of major theories, perspectives, and research methods 6. Explaining Human Behaviour and Culture: use an anthropological perspective to explain how diverse factors influence and shape human behaviour and culture; 7. Human Mental Processes and Behaviour: use a psychological perspective to describe how diverse factors influence and shape human mental processes and behaviour; 8. Explaining Social Behaviour: use a sociological perspective to explain how diverse factors influence and shape social behaviour;
