





Graduation 2024...mark your calendars! Vanier's graduation ceremony for the 2022/23 school year will occur on June 27th, 2024, at 10:00 am at the school. 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Peer-Tutoring


Peer tutoring is available for grades 9-11 students who want help with their Math, English,

Latin-America History Month at the TDSB - April 2024

The month of April is proudly recognized as Latin–America History Month at the Toronto District School Board. This year the focus and theme of 2024 is: "Weaving Our Legacies: Return to Our Collective Path | Enlazar Nuestres Legados: Volver a Nuestre Camino Colectivo." The "e" in Nuestres was purposefully chosen to disrupt the dominant and default patriarchal binary gender grammar system of the colonial language of Spanish. The intentional use of the letter "e" as gender inclusive was created by LGBTQIA+, gender non-binary, and feminist communities in what is recognized today as Latin-America.
