Dear Vanier Family,

This past week was yet another busy one at Vanier. Our spring teams - rugby, baseball, soccer, and ultimate frisbee – are up and running; SAC elections have started; and students are continuing to engage in plenty of enrichment opportunities. For example, the garden cub and their staff advisor, Mr. Berhane-Kiflue, have started cleaning our outdoor spaces in preparation



for the spring planting season. On Wednesday, May 8th, a few students from our BCU attended the "Raise the Black Bar" conference at the Court of Justice in downtown Toronto with staff supervisor Ms. Chichester. It was a fantastic opportunity for students – they visited two law courts, toured the Court of Justice, learned about Indigenous justice matters in the Indigenous Learning Centre, and met with Justice Lori Thomas and a Crown Representative.

You might remember a few weeks ago, that our Robotics Team was in Houston, Texas. Next week (May $15^{th} - 17^{th}$) our grade 10 STEM+ students will be on a field trip to Kingston and Ottawa as part of their CIVICS course. Some of the highlights of their trip will include guided tours

of Fort Henry, a UNESCO World Heritage Site in Kingston, Parliament Hill (west Block), which is the centre of Canadian Government and Politics, visits to the Canadian War Museum, the Supreme Court of Canada, the ByWard Market and the Canadian Science and Technology Museum to name a few. We wish our students a safe, educational, and enjoyable time.

As we approach the end of the school year, it's important to remember that according to the Ministry's assessment and evaluation policy, 30% of a student's grade will be determined by the final evaluation conducted towards the end of the course. This evaluation, overseen by a teacher, may consist of an exam, performance, essay, or other appropriate method. It's crucial for students and families to avoid scheduling conflicting activities during these culminating assessments or exam days. Missing a culminating task or exam without a valid reason will result in a zero grade for that assessment.

Last, but not least, this Sunday, May 12th, is Mother's Day. I want to wish all those who "mother", a happy Mother's Day. Thanks for all the tireless work you do.

Asian Heritage Month at the TDSB: May 2024

Asian Heritage Month has been proudly recognized at the Toronto District School Board during the month of May since 2007. This heritage is also celebrated by the Province of Ontario with the royal ascent of the <u>Asian Heritage Act (2005)</u> and across Canada since May 2002 when the federal Senate adopted a motion to officially designate May as Asian Heritage Month. This year's theme is **Our Journeys: Thriving Through Struggle and Triumph**.



The TDSB is the largest and one of the most diverse school boards in Canada. Nearly one-quarter of our students were born outside of Canada and collectively we speak more than 120 languages. According to the 2023 Student Census, 46% of TDSB students self-identified as Asian.

During the month of May, the Asian Heritage Month Volunteer Planning committee members are working

together to assemble various educational opportunities and resources for our students, staff and TDSB community to further learn about Asian heritage. 
