Dear Vanier Family,

We continue to enjoy a great start-up to the school year as we return to our regular slate of activities and start new ones. This past Wednesday, all our new STEM+ students spent a day at Forest Valley Outdoor Education Centre, engaging in team-building activities and getting to know each other (see pic on the right). Also on Wednesday, we had our first late start day for professional learning. Please remember that the 3rd and 4th Wednesday of every month are late start days, which means classes will begin at 9:55 am and end at 3:15 pm. We also had our photo day on Friday. Students will receive hard and digital copies of their photo ID within a couple of weeks. A reminder again that students will need these to gain access to all school events (e.g., sports games and school dances). The cost of the photo IDs is embedded in our annual student activity fee, which is \$35/student.

Truth and Reconciliation Week – September 23 – 27, 2024

Next week, September 23 - 27, will be Truth and Reconciliation Week. Students and staff will continue to intentionally engage in learning about Indigenous histories, realities, and perspectives to respond to and act upon the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada's 94 Calls to Action, especially:

#62. We call upon the federal, provincial, and territorial governments, in consultation and collaboration with Survivors, Aboriginal peoples, and educators, to:

i. Make age-appropriate curriculum on residential schools, Treaties, and Aboriginal peoples' historical and contemporary contributions to Canada **a mandatory education requirement for K - Gr. 12 students.**

Accident Insurance

The Toronto District School Board does not provide accident insurance coverage for student injuries that occur on school premises or during school sponsored activities. We recently noticed an increase in student injuries, in particular, dental injuries which are costly and could extend over several years.

General Information & News

1. **Day Schedule & Key Dates:** Our regular school day starts at **9:00 a.m. and ends at 3:15 p.m.** EXCEPT on late start days, where classes begin at **9:55 a.m.** and end at 3:15 p.m. Late start dates will be on the 3rd and 4th Wednesdays of every month. **Our first late start is next Wednesday, Sept 18, 2024.**

2. **Student Activity:** Please note that a \$35.00 student activity fee (SAF) will be collected from each student within the first three weeks of the school year. This SAF fee pays for a Yearbook, Vanier Athletic Association, Student ID card, and Student Council activities. Parents/guardians/caregivers are encouraged to use School Cash Online to pay the student activity fee.

3. **Reporting an Absence:** TDSB is offering a more efficient way for parents and caregivers to report all student absences, late arrivals, or future absences by using the [School Messenger](#) app. You can also report by calling the school messenger portal at **1-833-250- 2290**. All attendance being reported before 9:00 a.m. must be done using School Messenger. You no longer need to call the school directly.

4. **TDSB Connects App for Students.** The TDSB Connects app is available to all students through the [Google Play Store](#) and the [Apple App Store](#). The app contains school announcements and integrates with the school Google calendar and is an excellent way to make information available to students. Both these tools also link into the school's Brightspace Homepage. If possible, students are highly encouraged to download the APP on their devices.



5. Student Login and Password

Returning students - Please note that student accounts remained active over the summer and their passwords did not expire. As a result, student account passwords will not be centrally reset for school opening.

Students in Grades 5-12 can reset their own passwords directly on the login page of many online tools, including Brightspace and Zoom. Once registered, students will be able to use security questions, email, phone, text message or an “authenticator” smartphone app, to validate their password reset requests. New students - Students new to TDSB will have their password set to the Shared Secret Password. This is a combination of the last 4 digits of the student number, followed by 2 digits for your day of birth, and 2 digits for your month of birth, followed by “@Tdsb” (case sensitive and 13 characters in total).

7. Start of Year Forms

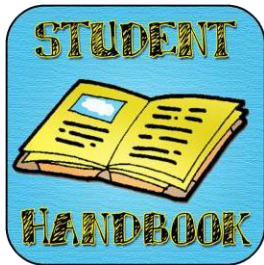
The technology used for the Start of the Year forms is changing. The PowerSchool Enrollment Module will be used by families to complete these forms online. Achievement

Course changes. Our Guidance team is still quite busy registering students and scheduling them into courses. We know that for various reasons (e.g., earning summer school credits), some students may need changes to their timetables. Indigenous Education

Compulsory Grade 11 English Course (NBE): Understanding Contemporary First Nations, Métis and Inuit Voices

As of September 2024, Understanding Contemporary First Nations, Métis, and Inuit Voices NBE3U/C/E will be the compulsory Grade 11 English course for TDSB students. This aligns with the Board's strategic direction and commitment to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada's Calls To Action (TRC) and the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP).

Contemporary First Nations, Métis and Inuit Voices, created by the Ministry of Education, has been taught in the TDSB with great success for many years and is supported by the Elders' Council, the Urban Indigenous Community Advisory Committee, the TDSB's Urban Indigenous Education Centre, and Indigenous writers, poets, and artists.

The NBE curriculum is organized into five strands shown below: (Four of which are the same as the current Grade 11 English course)

- A. First Nations, Métis, and Inuit Perspectives and Text Forms in Canada (**NEW**)
- B. Oral Communication
- C. Reading and Literature Studies
- D. Writing
- E. Media Studies

Equity

At Vanier, we will continue to work towards equitable outcomes for all our students by incorporating culturally relevant and responsive pedagogy into all courses. This involves getting to know our students in our classrooms and delivering material in a way that demonstrates students seeing themselves reflected through visual representation in the classroom, the content of learning material, and students' voices. We also offer two courses that specially target equity issues:

1) **Deconstructing Anti-Black Racism (IDC4UV).**

This course explores and deconstructs anti-Black racism, within a Canadian and North American context. It seeks to teach the terminology that encompasses the discussion of race and racism in the Canadian context as well as celebrate the diversity of the black experience, their excellence, and their part in advocacy.

2) **Equity and Social Justice: From Theory to Practice (HSE4M)**

This course enables students to develop an understanding of the theoretical, social, and historical underpinnings of various equity and social justice issues and to analyze strategies for bringing about positive social change. Students will learn about historical and contemporary equity and social justice issues in Canada and globally. They will explore power relations and the impact of a variety of factors on equity and social justice. Students will develop and apply research skills and will design and implement a social action initiative relating to equity or social justice issues.
