Raffle winners



Alyson Schafer Parent Presentation

On Thursday, October 27th, Alyson Schafer presented to parents from Glenview as well as our feeder schools on The Joys and Fears of the Pre-teen & Teen Years. She provided the parents with some strategies on how to keep the lines of communication open between parent and child as we give them a voice in the daily decisions that occur on a regular basis. From research, we have learned that during these years there is another growth spurt in brain development which helps explain some of the behaviours we see amongst our teens such as the need for more sleep! Talking through situations that cause anxiety and providing tangible strategies such as breathing when faced with these challenges are key components of helping our teens use effective coping mechanisms.



Halloween Activities

On Monday, October 31st in the afternoon, our students participated in self-selected Halloween activities which were supervised by staff. We were excited to see the number of costumes worn by both students and staff. Students participated in one of the following activities: a dance in the gym, movie, quiet time in the Library, the pool and games. This year we also had a "Catchup" room for

Superintendent visit

On Tuesday, November 1st, we had our second visit by our school superintendent, Vicky Branco. We are continuing our dialogue around our school improvement plan focusing on Student Achievement, Equity and Well-Being. At our next School Council meeting we will be sharing a video by our director, Doctor John Malloy on the TDSB's Vision of Learning. Our monthly visits by Ms. Branco, open up great dialogue in addition to visiting our classrooms to celebrate our successes in posting learning goals, anchor charts, success criteria and student work and looking at ways we can continue to improve our instructional programs.

Grade 8 End of the Year Trips and School Council

We are finalizing the details of our Grade 8 year-end trips from June 12-16, 2017 (except for New Brunswick which will be from June 11-16, 2017). Immunization – November 23rd and 24th

The Toronto Public Health department will be here on Wednesday, November 23rd for our Grade 7 students and Thursday, November 24th for our Grade 8 students to provide the appropriate immunization. The following inoculations will be provided to the students when parental consent was given:

Grade 7 students (boys and girls)

Meningococcal-ACYW – 1 dose

Human Papillomavirus (HPV) – 2 doses, 6 months apart

Hepatitis B – 2 doses, 6 months apart

Grade 8 students (girls only)

Human Papillomavirus (HPV) – 2 doses, 6 months apart

Lawrence Park Collegiate Visit

On Thursday, December 1st, the Grade 8 students who are in-district for Lawrence Park Collegiate will visit during the afternoon. They will be provided with pertinent information as well as the opportunity to tour the school. Any student not in-district, will remain at Glenview to work with other teachers.

Holiday Gift Baskets - Sharing with Families

For many years now during the holiday season, Glenview adopts several "Holiday Families". Again this year we are working with our school Social Worker, Joanne Kenny to support families in our community who are struggling. In doing so, each registration class will be working with a family to provide them with essentials and gifts to make the holiday celebration special.

Each adopted family will be providing us with a profile that comes with first names, ages, genders, clothing and shoe sizes of each family member along with a "Wish List" of items the family hopes to receive. Students will use the Holiday Wish List in their class to select an item for purchase. It is by no means mandatory; it is a guideline. One of the most important donations that can be given is grocery gift cards as these are considered our top priority for each family.

More information will be provided to our students at the end of November, however, we wanted to share this with you now so you are aware that this is up and coming. All donations must come in to the school no later than **Friday, December 16th**.

Our school participation in this initiative has been overwhelming in the past. Your support will make a positive impact in the lives of vulnerable families.

Professional Learning Communities (PLC)

This past week our Math and History/Geography teachers worked together in a professional learning community (PLC) to focus on specific areas. Our math teachers engaged in discussion around assessment and evaluation and how to incorporate the achievement chart (Knowledge, Thinking, Communication and Application) when assessing and evaluating student work. This type of assessment allows our students to better understand what types of questions they are answering and the areas they need to focus on for improvement. Our History/Geography PLC continued their discussion on inquiry-based learning from last year. They discussed the benefits of allowing students to develop questions around topics of interest once they are provided with some background knowledge from specific curriculum expectations. We were very fortunate to have our Learning Coach, Fayza Prebtani join us for this discussion. On October 13th, our English teachers met for their PLC on incorporating the Turning Points essay contest into their classes. All students will write an essay on a significant event that has impacted their lives. Teachers will guide their learning as they model the writing process. More information can be found at:

KIDS LIT QUIZ

Hello, my name is Caleb and I'm part of a group called Kids Lit Quiz. For those of you who don't know what that is, it involves groups of students who answer questions about literature. For Kids Lit Quiz there are many different genres and subjects in the competition so it is important to read a lot of books so you can diversify your knowledge of books. Some examples of previous subjects are Friends, Myths and Legends and Aliases.

About a week ago 10 other members of Glenview's Kids Lit Quiz and I went to John Ross Robertson Public School for a Kids Lit Quiz. We split up into two teams: grade 7s and grade 8s each with 4 of us.
