FROM THE OFFICE

As we approach the end of November and with only four weeks left before the holiday break, the students and staff are engaged in activities that foster critical thinking. The English department is working on their Turning Point essays as part of their professional learning community (PLC). Students in the computer lab are coding to make a robot dance, in design and technology, they have just finished a wood project consisting of items such as a picture frame, box or a design including their name. Students in family studies are learning to cook. We were pleased to be served hot and fresh chocolate chip cookies! In math, students are using manipulatives to learn about 3D shapes and our grade 8s are using protractor rulers as they create circles for their math unit. In science, students are working on structures; the Grade 8s built toys and in Grade 7 they were working on a structure that would support the most amount of weight. In history and geography we are looking at using inquiry-based learning to help students see the connection between the past and present, and to help inform our decisions for the future. Students are working on projects that will be engaging and be given the opportunity to choose the direction they would like to go. Students are getting ready for our concert so they can showcase all of their hours of practise. Students could be working on Quidditch, European handball, Tchoukball or basketball in phys. ed. Our Extended French students just completed a recipe unit and are now focusing on media studies,

in Immersion they just completed an identity unit and they are currently working on their logo designs for art. Grade 7 Core French students just finished a space exploration unit by way of video arcades and the grade 8s are working on weather and clothing. This would be a great opportunity to talk to your child about one or some of these projects.

Coyotes in field/ravine

It was brought to our attention by a few residents surrounding Glenview that two coyotes have been spotted during the early morning in our school yard going into the ravine. Please be extra vigilant if you have a dog and know that the City has been contacted to inform them of this spotting.

Dropping off Items or Signing out Early

On a regular basis we are having parents drop off items for their child during the school day. It is recommended that students who have forgotten something come down to the office to see if anything has been left for them. If there has not been anything dropped off, then students may use the phone to see if anybody can bring the forgotten item. They can come down to the office later to check if the item has since been left. We try very hard not to disrupt the learning in the classrooms with interruptions, so please be sure your son/daughter is aware of this protocol. Also, if your child is signing out early, please send them with a note so that it can be shown to the teacher and they come to the office without being called.

Progress Interviews

It was great to see so many of our parents during parent and teacher interviews that were scheduled on Thursday, November 17th and Friday, November 18th. We had a number of parents stop by the office to share how happy his/her child is at Glenview. We thank all of you for your flexibility with booking interviews and dropping into see specific teachers. If you were not able to schedule a time with a teacher on the scheduled days, please send them an email and they will book an alternate time.

Remembrance Day Assembly

On Friday, November 11th, we had our Remembrance Day assembly for our students, staff and guests which was organized by Mark Richardson and Taline Baltayan. It was a well-delivered assembly that allowed the whole school to reflect on the importance of peace in our World. Thank you to the choir who sang the song *The Clouds* led by Jacky So and Jennifer Chiu. We would like to acknowledge how well our students behaved during this sombre assembly as they recognized the important messages being shared.

Grade 8 End of the Year Trips

On November 16th, we had an assembly for our Grade 8 students to share information about our overnight trips in June 2017. All students were able to select their top four choices and we are in the process of finalizing our numbers for each of the trips. Students will receive the full registration package in the near future.

Bullying Awareness Week

November 21 through November 25 celebrates bullying awareness week in Canada. Our student council have had 2 hours of training in the ins and outs of bullying and cyberbullying. This week they conducted two sessions in each classroom on these topics. Thursday and Friday of this week, our students had an opportunity to complete an anonymous survey on the topic of cyberbullying. We will collect the data together as a group, and make recommendations to our Safe and Caring Committee, based on the outcome of the survey. They have been reiterating that the hallmarks of bullying include repeated actions, intentional harm, exclusion, shaming. Cyberbullying takes on a different hue considering the availability of technology in our children's' lives. It is often noted that when we were children our home was our "safe" space, and today even homes are virtually invaded by Instagram and snapchat. Cyberbullying has been defined as the use of technology to harass, threaten, embarrass or target another person.

Please be vigilant with your child about the respectful use of technology.
