It is hard to believe that the March break is just days away! In the last two weeks, our English, French and Math teachers have been busy outside of the classroom as they have been involved in Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) to continue to develop units that foster critical thinking skills for our students.

- The English classes are focusing on various social justice issues as students work at creating
 a short film using the iPads. We are also tying this pathway into the TIFF films we will be
 seeing in April. Students will be doing a writing activity relating to the challenges faced by
 the protagonist.
- The French teachers are in the planning stage of developing an inquiry that possibly will relate to French culture in the world.
- On Monday, March 6th, we had the pleasure of welcoming Trevor Brown to our school who worked with our math teachers during a professional learning session. Trevor Brown is well known in the math community for creating rich tasks for our students using a problem solving model. The purpose of teaching math in this format is to create an engaging learning

environment that teaches the students to think conceptually rather than instrumentally. Our staff will begin incorporating these types of questions and teaching strategies into their classes so that our students can benefit from this type of learning. In the spring we are going to invite Trevor Brown to Glenview to do a parent evening session. Staffing

On Tuesday, March 21st, we will be receiving our staffing allocation for the 2017-18 school year. Shortly after this, we will begin working with the Staffing Committee to develop a staffing model that will meet the needs of Glenview. Once the model is approved by our superintendent, we will begin to assign teachers to a specific position. The whole process will continue until the end of May and it is our goal to inform the parents by the end of June of teachers' assignments for next year. In the late spring, we will begin meeting with our Grade 7 teachers to determine class placement for our students going into Grade 8 next year. Many factors will determine class placements such as balancing our classes based on gender, music programs (e.g., band, strings, and general music), balancing boys/girls and dynamics of students. As you can imagine, this is a very important process that takes a lot of time, and consideration and it is done in consultation with teachers. As for the incoming Grade 6 students, we will be meeting with the Grade 6 teachers from the many feeder schools coming to Glenview to gather information that will allow for a smooth transition.

We would like to congratulate our Boys' Hockey team for winning the City Finals today against Hollycrest. We were fortunate to bring 225 students to cheer on our team and to show amazing school spirit! In addition, we would like to congratulate the Grade 8 Girls' Volleyball team who placed second in the City finals. An article will be included in the next edition of Parentview for both teams.
