FROM THE OFFICE

Spring has almost sprung! Since returning from March Break we have enjoyed the warmer temperatures and more classes have been going outside to enjoy the nicer weather.

Glenview hosted a fabulous 22nd Performing Arts Festival last night. Thank you to all the students that participated in PAF and showcased their multiple talents. We are fortunate to have students at Glenview who have such a wide variety of talents that include singing, dancing, magic, martial arts, instruments, monologue and rondo. It was a great success and we appreciate the community support. This endeavour could not have been undertaken without the extra efforts of staff and students.

On Tuesday, April 18, the whole school will be going to TIFF (Toronto International Film Festival for Children). We will be leaving Glenview at 9:30 am and returning at approximately 1 pm. Students must bring a packed lunch that day because they will be eating at TIFF. All students are expected to attend this exciting learning experience and pre and post activities will take place in classrooms. The servery will be closed on April 18. Permission forms will be going home on Monday, April 3rd.

The TDSB conducted its first *Student Census* for all Grade 7-12 students in 2006 and the second one in 2011. The data collected from both rounds of the *Census* have provided the school system, parents and the community with valuable information to help improve our schools for the benefit of all students. The third *Student Census* is coming up in April 2017. The questions are similar to the previous *Census* questions, which asks students about themselves, their experiences in and outside of school, and their well-being. At Glenview, we have set aside Period 5 (2:15 pm) on Tuesday, April 18th to write the *Census*. Any student who is absent will write on an alternative day that is to be set. If you do not wish your child to participate, please complete the attachment at the bottom of Parentview and return it to school by Monday, April 3rd.

Our Staffing Committee, composed of staff and parents, have been working diligently to develop a staffing model for September 2017. We will have a total of 26 classes which is the same as this year. We will keep you informed of our progress and the new model will be attached to the last edition of Parentview in June.

Our Spring concert is scheduled at Lawrence Park Collegiate on Wednesday, May 24th beginning at 6:30 p.m. There will be more information to follow shortly.

INTERNATIONAL DAY OF PINK – WEDNESDAY, APRIL 12TH

On Wednesday, April 12th, Glenview is participating in the International Day of Pink. It is a day where communities across the country, and across the world, can unite in celebrating diversity and raising awareness to stop homophobia, transphobia and all forms of bullying. The International Day of Pink was started in Nova Scotia when 2 straight high school students saw a gay student wearing a pink shirt being bullied. The 2 students intervened but wanted to do more to prevent homophobic and transphobic bullying. They decided to purchase pink shirts, and a few days later got everyone at school to arrive wearing pink, standing in solidarity. The result was that an entire school took a stand and began working together to prevent all forms of bullying.

On Friday, March 31st, during period 1, all students will be participating in a lesson called "Outside the Box" so we can begin our discussion here at school and establish a common language. As you can see from the picture below, we have a bulletin board created to promote acceptance for all and reduce bullying and homophobic language throughout our school. We will be having a school-wide assembly on Wednesday, April 12th and we are challenging our students and staff to wear PINK that day and stand up to bullying. On March 7th, 20 students from Glenview competed at the 11th Annual Mackenzie Science and Engineering Olympiad at Mackenzie Collegiate. Students were selected based on their observable efforts, focus in class, and a demonstrated interest in science and the event. They had to be able to work well independently and cooperatively in a group, without supervision. Students were divided into teams of 3 or 4 and competed against the other teams in events located all over the school. Students were welcomed by Mackenzie's Science Club members, many of whom were part of the MaCS program including many former Glenview-ites.

There were 12 schools represented with about 280 students competing in 20 events in Biology, Chemistry, Computer Science, Engineering, Math, and General Knowledge.

Some students also got to participate in ELO (Enriched Learning Opportunities) which provided students with a chance to see what high school students learn daily. Some had a chance to dissect a rat; conduct experiments based on food sciences, chemistry explosions and use "Little Bits" circuit kits.

There were 20 events which took place in total throughout the day. Glenview had 1st Place finishes in Shaping for Stealth (Engineering) Fermi (Math), with Ben Panet, Programming Your eBot (Technical) and Minimization (Math), 2nd place finishes in Hot Spring Sprint (Chemistry), Build it to Win It Teacher's Event (Engineering), Erosion Confusion (Biology) and Puzzling Pieces (Math) and 3rd Place finishes in Grade 8 Science Relay, (General Knowledge) Maria Y. was awarded the Glenview Young Scientist Award.

Glenview brought home the Silver Medal overall for 2nd place team finish overall, directly on the heels of the Gold Medal team.

Congratulations to all team members. You demonstrated good citizenship, sportsmanship in competition, and true Gryphon spirit. Your camaraderie was evident whether you were cheering on your teammates or doing your best in your own event. Both Ms. Elshayeb and I would like to thank all the students who represented Glenview as part of the Science Olympics team. The third TDSB *Student Census* is coming up in April 2017. For the first time, Grade 4-6 students will participate in this system-wide survey in class, together with Grade 7-12 students. The questions are similar to the previous *Census* questions, which ask students about themselves, their experiences in and outside of school, and their well-being. This information is collected under the authority of section 170(1)(6) of the Education Act (R.S.O. 1990, c. E. 2) for educational and research purposes only.

Each survey form has a unique code (for tracking purposes). However, no personal identification - such as, student name or ID number - will appear on the form. This is to ensure that the information provided by students will remain confidential. All completed survey forms will be shipped directly to the Board's Research Department for processing and analyses, and all the survey results will be reported at the aggregate level.

To ensure that this *Student Census* will reflect the voices of all students, it is important to have as many students complete the survey as possible. However, should you decide not to have your child participate in this *Census*, please fill out the form below and return it to your child's school before March 31, 2017.
