#### FROM THE OFFICE

We are always amazed at how many things Glenview is involved with when we sit down to write each newsletter. The hallways of our school are busy from 7:15 in the morning to 5:00 pm as students are dropped off to participate in various sports/clubs or they are coming in to receive extra help from one of their teachers.

<u>Lates</u> - We are noticing an increase in the number of late students in the morning. Please encourage your child to develop a morning routine that will give them enough time to eat a healthy breakfast, have their bag packed for school and enough travel time. It is imperative that students are present to hear important morning announcements and to receive instructions from the beginning of each period.

Ms. Calligan's Weekly Math Problem – Just this past week, Ms. Calligan posted a math problem on Monday to challenge our Grade 7 and 8 students to solve. They have a week to solve the problem

in order to enter into a draw on Friday's for a reward. I encourage you to work with your child at solving these problems as Ms. Calligan will provide feedback on each solution handed in. Good luck Glenview!

<u>Staffing Update</u> - We are in the final phase of putting together our staffing model for September 2017. We still need to hire a few teachers. Glenview will continue to deliver strong programs where teachers will be specialists in their subject area. We will continue to be working on a 10-day cycle for our timetable. Our teaching staff will continue to have opportunities to work with colleagues to develop programs to meet the different needs of our students.

Grade 8 Classes September 2017 – As we mentioned in a previous newsletter, we will be having conversations with our teaching staff in June for Grade 8 class placements for our current Grade 7 students. Our Grade 7 teachers this year will be the ones deciding the classes for Grade 8s. We will continue to have five English classes, three Extended French and six French Immersion in Grade 8. We will do our best to balance the classes on male/female ratio as well as respecting the music options of our students and to ensure there is a wide range of ability in each class. Students moving forward to Grade 8 will be placed in classes where they will know someone from this year but again, placement will be decided by Grade 7 teachers as they know the students best after working with them for a year.

<u>Sports</u> – We currently have a number of students involved in sports right. They are participating in Soccer, Ultimate Frisbee and Track and Field. Included in this edition of Parentview are articles on Co-Ed Volleyball and Badminton.

<u>Dress Code</u> – Now that the warm weather is upon us, this is a good time to review Glenview's Dress Code (page 10 in the agenda and attached to the bottom of the newsletter). We would appreciate our families taking some time to review this page and to work with us to ensure that our students arrive dressed appropriately for school.

<u>Blue Jays</u> - On Tuesday, May 9<sup>th</sup>, over 300 students, staff and Glenview families attended the Blue Jay game against Cleveland. The Glenview choir auditioned to sing the American and Canadian anthem. What an amazing opportunity for our students! We would like to say a special thank you to Mr. So for conducting the choir, Ms. Percy-Robb for playing the piano when submitting the audition tape and Ms. Chiu who worked behind the scenes with the Blue Jays to select a date and organizing all the tickets!

<u>Turning Points Essay</u> - We would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge Parker O. who received an honourable mention for his Turning Point essay as part of our English pathway.

<u>Parent Council</u> - On Tuesday, May 16<sup>th</sup>, we had a great turnout to our last Parent Council meeting of this school year. We invited our feeder school parents to come out to hear what Glenview is all about and to ask those burning questions about our vision and what we do to support our students. We look forward to our continued work with our current students and to welcome our new Grade 6s who are coming in September 2017. We would like to thank Robin Confliffe for being our School Chair as well as Sanja Baca and Ian Aukeman for being the Co-Treasurers and Keri Dang for being the Secretary. We are looking forward to working with the Council again next year. The first council meeting will be held on Tuesday, September 19, 2017

#### **GAUSS 2017**

GAUSS is a math contest that chooses students to participate that show capability and perseverance to achieve in math. Five students were selected from each class to participate in the contest that took place on May 10<sup>th</sup> at Glenview. A month before the GAUSS contest took place, there was another test called the math league contest where every student in the school participated, the top scoring student from each class got automatic entry into the GAUSS contest. The other four students got chosen if they volunteered and their teacher and other officials reviewed their academic progress. Most students volunteered but only a select few got to write the test.

There were three sections of the test: part A, part B and part C. Each question in part A was worth 5 points, each question in part B was worth 6 points and each question in part C was worth 8 points. There was a rule that stated that each unanswered question was worth 2 points (each wrong answer was worth no points). There were 25 questions in total and you could leave 10 questions blank. Each student could score up to 150 points. The first section had the easiest questions and after that, the test got progressively harder, the third section was made up of 5 long questions that were considered to be the hardest.

Overall, the GAUSS contest is a great way to get kids thinking and prepared to succeed in math. We would like to say a special thank you to Robin Conliffe and Eman Jayousi for volunteering their time to help surpervise.

## CANADIAN FLUID POWER CHALLENGE

Our team of 4 representing Glenview attended a workshop at Dixon Grove Middle School to learn how to design a hydraulic machine to complete a challenge. The team, Aristides L., Thea L., Madeline G. and Marcus U. were chosen by Mr. Corkill after they scored the highest on their Science Hydraulic projects in the Grade 8 fluids unit. After the full day workshop, we were given a challenge and 3 weeks to design, build a prototype, test and evaluate in order to attend a competition against 120 other students. For the three weeks, we gave up many of our lunch hours, after school time as well as some class time to spend on our challenge. We tried to come up with the most original idea we could, something no one else could think of. After many hours and challenges we worked together as a team and completed a prototype. We then had to make a 20 page portfolio with Orthographic and Isometric designs and off to the competitions we went. We could not bring anything with us except our designs. The competition started and we had 3.5 hours to make our prototype that took us 3 weeks to make! After the time had finished, out prototype was done and ready for the competition. We pulled #10 as our demonstration time. Each time had 2 minutes to use their machine to complete the task as many times as possible. The task was to lift a block and place it in a Fibonacci sequence arc to get points. As we were completing the challenge our machine malfunctioned and we couldn't move any more blocks. In the end the Canadian Challenge organizer commented that we had one of the most unique machines he had ever seen and he has been organising this event for over 20 years! After all the judging was done we ended up in 4<sup>th</sup> place. We were upset at the results but agreed with the judges. We learned so much about Engineering, Forces, Math, Science and not giving up! Thanks to Mr. Corkill for giving up his lunches, preps and after school time. We would do it all over again if we could!


# **Grade 8 Students and Parents**

# ACCEPTABLE

Words or symbols on clothing that depict positive ideals and social values

# UNACCEPTABLE
